THE EARN AND GIVE CAMPAIGN

What Will the Boys of New Brunswick Do?

In the great crisis of the hour boys are being called upon to perform man-size tasks. In the great campaign planned to raise millions for the Red Triangle of the Y.M.C.A., the boys of Canada have a part in what is known as the Earn and Give Campaign.

The movement originated in the United States, where last year the boys raised over a million dollars; and when the Canadian boys were informed of the fact, they asked that the same opportunity be given them. Their request has been granted, and the National Council of the Y.M.C.A. have planned a campaign for the Canadian boys.

As already stated, this parallels the campaign now being carried on among the men. The aim is to get 6,000 boys to raise \$60,000. Of this amount, the first \$50,000 will be devoted to work among the soldiers overseas and at home. The next \$5,000, if raised will go towards Boys' work in China and India; while the last \$5,000 if raised, will go towards Boys' work in Canada.

In New Brunswick the aim is to get 410 boys to earn and give \$10 apiece—the payment of which will be spread over a period of say, ten months. Ten dollars will enable the Canadian Y.M.C.A. to give its assistance to one soldier continuously for at least a year.

Behind this appeal is the great call to National service and sacrifice; there is the call to stand behind the brothers and the fathers who have gone overseas. The fathers, mothers and sisters, by contributing to the Patriotic, I.O.D.E., and Red Cross work are performing well their part. What will the boys of Canada in general and of New Brunswick, and of this county in particular do? Our impression is that they will respond nobly to the call.

The dates for this campaign are May 2-9. Rev. A. D. Archibald of Pictou, N. S., has been appointed organizer for N. B. and Rex L. York has charge of the movement in Hartland. It is hoped that men will be secured for Florenceville and Centreville.
