NURSE'S TRIAL FOR  
MURDER OF FORMER  
FREDERICTON GIRL

Death of Mrs. Henry Anderson  
Said to Have Resulted from  
Illegal Operation.

THE EXAMINATION  
AT VANCOUVER, B. C.

Cross-examination for the De-  
fence Arouses Interest of  
Medical Profession.

The preliminary hearing in the  
trial of Mrs. Ida L. Ironmonger, a  
maternity nurse, who is being held  
by the Vancouver police on the  
charge of having performed an ille-  
gal operation which caused the death  
of Mrs. Henry Anderson, formerly  
Miss Nellie Tobin, of this city, was  
commenced at that place last week.

The Vancouver Sun has the fol-  
lowing account of the court proceed-  
ings:

Henry Anderson, the husband of  
the deceased, and his daughter, Flo-  
rence, gave evidence. The greater  
portion of the evidence for the pro-  
secution was given by the medical  
witnesses who were called in after  
the death of Mrs. Anderson, and who  
later made the postmortem examina-  
tion.

Doctors Turnbull and Kennedy evi-  
denced that they had received a tele-  
phone message for an emergency case, but  
Mrs. Anderson was dead before they  
arrived. Dr. Curtis gave the results  
of the postmortem. The medical evi-  
dence went to prove that deceased  
had died from shock.

Mr. Rubinowitz, the counsel for  
Mrs. Ironmonger, subjected some of  
the medical witnesses to a lengthy  
and severe cross-examination, and  
tried to elicit that the injuries could  
only have been self-inflicted, and  
that the doctors could not say what  
was the precise cause of death. The  
manner of cross-examination excited  
general interest, showing that a law-  
yer may have an unsuspected ac-  
quaintance with the technical terms  
of the medical profession. The case  
is entirely one of circumstantial evi-  
dence.

Taking the usual step, counsel said,  
of calling one of the defence witness-  
es, because the witness, whose name  
was not given, might not be avail-  
able at the assizes, certain conver-  
sations which might have taken place  
between this witness and the de-  
ceased, were given in evidence.

Mrs. Ironmonger, who appeared to  
be a woman of refinement, seemed to  
feel her position very acutely, as she  
remained with her head bowed dur-  
ing the whole hearing.

YORK COUNTY GIRL  
MET TRAGIC FATE

Miss Beatrice Allen Drowned  
While Crossing Machias  
River on Boom.

Friends in this city have received  
word of the tragic drowning at Ma-  
chias, Maine, of Miss Beatrice Allen,  
nineteen years old, daughter of Mr.  
and Mrs. George W. Allen, of Calais,  
formerly residents of Lower Haynes-  
ville, York county.

Messrs. Perley Haines and Elwood  
Haines, of Burt's Corner, returned  
yesterday from Calais where they at-  
tended the deceased's funeral on Mon-  
day. The drowning occurred on  
Thursday, May 9th, and the body was  
recovered on Monday, after having  
been in the water eleven days.

From the information at hand, it  
appears that Miss Allen, who was a  
student at the Washington Normal  
School, was walking across a boom  
over the Machias river, when she lost  
her balance and the swift current  
soon carried her over the falls.

The sorrowing parents have the  
deep sympathy of all in their sad be-  
reavement.

C. L. BOWERS TO BE  
CHIEF ENGINEER AT  
PUMPING STATION

Water Works Committee Say  
They Could Not Get Proper-  
ly Qualified Local Man.

SALARY TO BE  
NINE HUNDRED

Wage of Assistant Engineers  
and Firemen Increased to  
\$700 Last Evening.

The City Council, convening in  
special session last evening, appoint-  
ed Mr. C. L. Bowers as chief engineer  
of the water works pumping station  
and filtration plant, at a salary of  
\$900 per annum. The decision was  
reached after considerable discussion.  
Ald. Farrell, although not opposing  
the appointment of Mr. Bowers,  
pointed out that the committee might  
have found it advisable to appoint a  
local man to the position.

Mayor Hooper was called upon to  
give another casting vote in the mat-  
ter of the rental of the City Opera  
House to the Fredericton Baseball  
Club for their recent production of  
"Captain Bing." On the casting vote  
the rental was fixed at \$25.

In a resolution moved by Ald. Ever-  
ett, and seconded by Ald. Mitchell, a  
glowing tribute was paid the late  
Malcolm Ross, who was chief engi-  
neer at the pumping station for over  
27 years, and during whose term of  
office there had never been a single  
accident from negligence.

## Baseball Club Account Reduced.

A communication was read from  
the Secretary-Treasurer of the Fred-  
erickton Baseball Club asking the  
council for a reduction in the account  
against the club for the rental of the  
Opera House, in connection with the  
recent performance of the opera,  
"Captain Bing." The present account  
was \$53.50.

Ald. Boyce said that he was of the  
opinion that the club should be  
charged only for the actual expenses  
incurred in connection with the per-  
formances. He understood from the  
city clerk that about \$38 would cover  
the actual expenses and moved that  
the account be reduced to that  
amount.

Ald. Farrell said that on this par-  
ticular occasion the Council might  
well afford to be generous in the mat-  
ter. The baseball club was a good  
advertisement for Fredericton abroad  
and as in this instance a portion of  
the receipts had been given to the  
Victoria Hospital, a very worthy  
cause, the council might very well re-  
duce the amount. It would be useless  
for him, he said, to make a motion  
that would carry, but still he desired  
to express his opinion that the coun-  
cil might accept \$38.00, and if the  
funds of the club permitted it at the  
end of the season, the account might  
be paid.

Ald. Scott thought that \$30 would  
be a reasonable charge.

Ald. Mitchell thought that it would  
be a difficult matter to ascertain just  
what the expenses would be and fa-

FILES DIVORCE  
PAPERS AGAINST  
W. M. HAWTHORNE

Married in 1889, and Lived  
Together Until 1904, When  
Wife Left.

CHARGES HUSBAND  
WITH UNFAITHFULNESS

Also With Cruelty and Non-  
Support—St. Mary's Wo-  
man Co-respondent.

Mrs. Lillie E. Hawthorne, of this  
city, through her attorney, Mr. Percy  
A. Guthrie, has filed action for di-  
vorce against her husband, Mr. Wil-  
liam M. Hawthorne.

The plaintiff in her bill of com-  
plaint cites that as one Miss Lillie  
E. Peel, she agreed to marry one  
William M. Hawthorne, and the two  
were duly married on May 20th,  
1888, at the residence of Edmond H.  
Hawthorne, at Maplehurst, in the pa-  
rish of Kent, Carleton County, N. B.,  
the Rev. Charles F. Rideout, a Bap-  
tist minister, performing the sacred  
service.

Mr. and Mrs. Hawthorne lived  
together as husband and wife, and in  
1889 a child was born. In 1895 the  
parties moved to Fredericton, where  
they lived at several places for some  
time until the said William M. Haw-  
thorne erected a house on Park St.  
in this city, where they lived until  
1904. In the same year Mrs. Haw-  
thorne alleges that on account of the  
unfaithfulness of her husband she  
was forced to leave him and after-  
wards removed with her daughter to  
St. John.

A well known resident of St. Mary's  
is named as co-respondent, and the  
plaintiff also accuses the defendant  
with cruelty and non-support, she  
having been compelled to earn a  
living for herself and daughter by  
dressmaking.

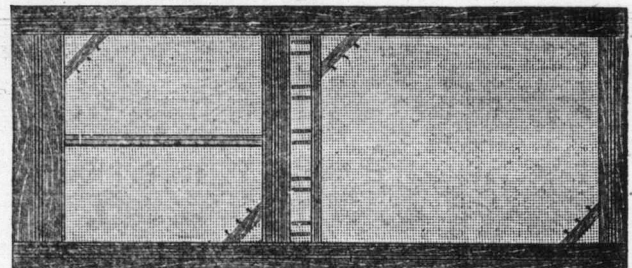
