

FREDERICTON, March 19.—Hon. Mr. Blair formitted a bill to provide for registration of births, deaths and marriages, Mr. Murray in the chair. He explained the bill and spoke of its importance. Under it the provincial sec-retary became registrar general, without bow-ever, any additional salary.
