

Gallant Deeds by Canadians

Recapture and Hold 1500 yards of Trenches from the Germans Near Zillebeke

London, June 14—"At 10.30 in the morning the Canadian troops made a gallant and successful assault south-east of Zillebeke. Their objective was our old position in that neighborhood, all of which was captured on the front attacked, extending from the southern portion of Sanctuary Wood to a point about 1000 yards north of Hill 60, a total front of over 1500 yards. In the course of the assault heavy losses were inflicted on the enemy and three officers and 123 men were taken prisoner. Our troops were subjected to a severe shelling, for several hours after gaining the position, but were well supported by our artillery and retain the ground gained, which is being consolidated. Heavy bombardments by the enemy continued during the day, to which our artillery replied effectively. Attempts of hostile infantry to counter-attack were frustrated by our artillery fire."

Presbyterians Stand For Square Deal

"Penman," writing in St. John Telegraph of the General Assembly says: Rev. John G. Shearer, D. D., interpreted the mission of the Christian church as being under the obligation of her Master, to labor to give a "square deal" to every man, woman and child, and to every class in the organized life of the community. He has been leader in the social service work of the church ever since its inception nine years ago. He has been closer to the problem of the industrial and social world in all its phases than perhaps any other man in the church. Like John Knox he is a man "who fears not the fact of flesh." Many of the laws upon the statute book of Canada today which make for the purifying of social and public life are there because of the influence exerted or originated by him. The square deal to the toiling masses, the moneyed classes, the women and the children of the land—this is the objective of his persistent effort, and in the applause which greeted his entrance, it was plain that he gave expression to the ideal of the whole church. A chain of seven homes across Canada for preventive and redemptive work among the women of the street, with the latch string always out, and within reasonable reach of any young girl in Canada who wants such a refuge; a record of 1132 girls in six years helped to a renewed purity and opportunity, seventy to ninety per cent. of whom have made good. This is no small achievement, and the work is only begun. And so the endeavor goes on, in the interest of the drunkard and the possible drunkard, the new Canadian and the old Canadian, everybody and every class, until Canada comes to be known as the land where every man shall be given a square deal, the square deal of the gospel of Christ.

Allies' Cooperative Strategy

From the outbreak of the war cooperation has been the keynote of both belligerents. With the central powers it has been forced cooperation, just as force has been the dominating note with them throughout Germany has simply taken command of Austria, Turkey and Bulgaria from the beginning. With the allies cooperation had had its true and full meaning: Russia, France, England and Italy have all conducted their own independent campaigns and had entire control and administration of their own affairs but they have each and all advised together and worked in union, each making its efforts assist the others whenever there was need. The last few weeks show strong evidence of the rapid approach of the greatest battles of the present war with probable decisive actions not many months off. Since the success of the Caucasian campaign of the Russian forces has made it clear that the last outlet of Germany, by land, was rapidly being cut off, there have been terrific battles at Verdun, Ypres, and along the Italian border. The Central Powers have lost enormously in those battles and have made gains of but a few yards in the first line trenches except on the Italian front where the gains were somewhat larger. Just at this time, the Russian army has "come back" with great victory along the entire Austro-Russian border. In less than ten days she has driven the entire Austrian force back a distance averaging fifteen miles over a front of nearly 100 miles, with enormous captures of men, supplies, and equipment. This is cooperation of the very best. By it she will either compel the central powers to shift forces from Verdun and Ypres to help Austria or Austria will rapidly crumble and let the "BEAR" in. Either way spells big trouble for Austria and the Central powers.

For Returned Soldiers

Australia Will Make Ample Provision For Them, and Canada and N.B. are Awake to the Importance of the Matter

A London paper says: The Federal and State Governments of Australia have taken definite steps with a view to settling returned soldiers upon the land as occasion arises. At an important conference held in Melbourne a very complete scheme was adopted under which the money is to be found by the Commonwealth Government, and the actual provision of the land for soldiers is to remain in the hands of the State Governments.
It is suggested that a sum of over £20,000,000 be set aside for this most laudable object, and that money should be advanced to the settlers through the State agricultural banks and kindred institutions at a very moderate rate of interest during the pioneering stages. Most of the States have the machinery already in existence for their purpose, and if the scheme protected be put in force the result must be good, not only from the point of view of the individual settlers, but also from that of the States generally.

The New South Wales Minister for Lands has stated that 200 farms are available for returned soldiers. One hundred of these are on the irrigation area, 55 in North Coast dairying districts, some others suitable for wheat in the Dubbo district and about 23 ideal orchard blocks just beyond Windsor. In each case the soldier settler would receive financial assistance to the extent of about £300 if necessary. The Government also intended to provide about 3,000 additional farms, two-thirds of them on Crown lands and the remaining one-third on resumed properties.

In Canada preparations for returning soldiers are not so far advanced as in Australia, but there is a good deal of talk about immigration plans. The New Brunswick Provincial Government is considering a comprehensive scheme of immigration. It is understood that this Government favors the community plan of settlement. This will provide for several hundred families, and will probably mean an expenditure of \$1,500,000 or more. The province owns thousands of acres of fertile lands along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific, the Kent Northern, and other lines of railway, and it is probable that some of these lands will be set apart for this purpose. Commissioner Lamb, of the Salvation Army, has suggested to the authorities the taking over to Canada of war widows and their families, and the provincial immigration authorities are considering the scheme.

Manufacturers Favor Registration

Hamilton, Ont., June 14—At this morning's session of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the members went on record as favoring immediate registration for military purposes.

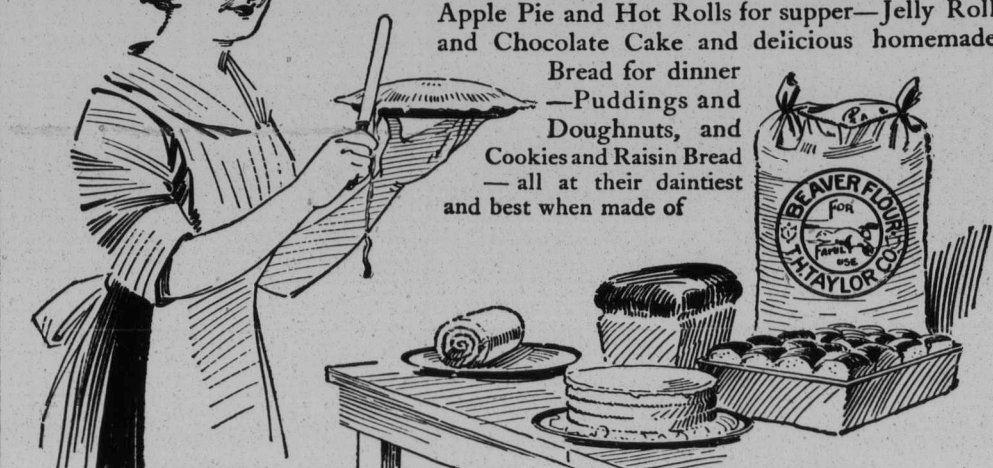

Church Union Carries 4 to 1

Winnipeg, June 14—The official vote on Church Union, at the Presbyterian General Assembly, was 406 in favor and 83 against. The number absent or not voting was 117. The ministers of the church voted more largely for the change than the laymen, contrary to the ordinary expectation. Of the ministers present, 222 voted for union and only 45 against. Of the laymen 184 voted for union and 43 against.
At the evening service Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell read a statement recording his dissent from the decision of the assembly in the church union matter and the dissent of those who signed with him. The dissent stated that the small minority, 45 ministers and 43 elders, regarded themselves now as the true Presbyterian General Assembly, and that they did not regard any of the other ministers or elders as having any right in the assembly. They propose, however, to go on doing business as usual, under this protest.
