REVISION OF THE TARIFF

The Western Grain-Growers Asso ciation and Western newspapers are demanding a sweeping reduction in the Canadian Customs Tariff, while the Manufacturers' Association are showing cause why in the present situation of the country, our system of fiscal policy should not be interferred

It seems to be quite certain that changes in our fiscal policy will be made during the present session, but Opposition will not be likely to make any move until the Government policy has been announced.

Some of us who remember the "National Policy" fight between the late Alexander McKenzie, Premier, and Sir John MacDonald, Leader of the Opposition, wonder what kind of a tariff arrangement a Government com posed of such protectionists as Premier Borden, Hon. George Foster, etc. Conservatives, and such free traders as Hon. N. W. Rowell, Hon. H. Guth rie and other Liberals, will turn out. One would naturally think that this combination ought to hit the mark about right, and give the country a tariff which will not bear too heavily on the consumer, and at the san time not cripple the manufacturer. If the men who are in the Union Govern ment cannot formulate a just and rea sonable tariff which will be acceptable to the majority of the Canadian people, then no Government can.
