Liquid Manure.

It is chiefly in the summer time, when plants are in active growth, that liquid manure is applied to them. It is a mistake to give plants that are not well rooted much of it, but when they have plenty of roots, and are growing from everywhere, it is beneficial; but as liquid manure is often a source and always a valuable commodity, it should be used in such a way as to secure the best possible return from it. In the case of plants in pots, when they have many roots they are always apt to become quickly dry in hot weather, and many of them are often so dry that when the water is given them a large quantity of it passes through the soil and runs to waste. It is a mistake to allow manure water to be wasted in this way, it does the plants little or no good. The most economical and advantageous way
