Service in Westminster Hall

London, May 12.—The service in Westminster Hall on Tuesday next will be brief. The music will be under the direction of Sir Frederick Bridge. The voices will be accom panied. The 23rd Psalm will be sung as an ordinary chant. "Blest are the Departed", from Spohr's "Last Judgment," will follow, and the only other musical portion of the service will be the funeral hymn, "O God, Our Help in Ages Past," sung by a choir of fifty voices.

The Home Office has limited the number of wreaths that will be accepted at the funeral of the King Among representative wreaths, those presented by the self-governing colon ies will have a prominent place.

South Africa has agreed to act in concert, so that its wreath will bear the names of all four contributory colonies about to enter the Union. Of the important public bodies to which the privilege of presenting wreath to be granted is the Royal Colonial Institute, which will be in the forefront with a wreath emblematic of the unity of the Empire

General Mourning in the Dominion

Ottawa, May 11.— The Masonic lodges of Ottawa will unite in a memorial service for King Edward at All Saints Church, on Sunday, May 22. It will be held to honor the memory of the departed monarch as Past Grand Master of the Grand United Lodges of England. The local lodges will march to the church in full regalia and Rev.

A. W. Mackay will preach. Scores of telegrams of regret at the death of the late King have been received by the Canadian Government from the principal Government and public bodies throughout the whole Dominion. A noteworthy feature in connection with them is that some have also been received from the United States, where King Edward was well known and much liked. These have all been sent here for transmission to the British Govern-

No Open Air Joint Service.

The Dominion Government has not yet received official notification of the date set for the funeral of Edward VII., but preparations are under way for the issuance of the extra of the Canada Gazette, which will declare the day of the funeral one of general mourning and a general holiday.

The suggestion that there should be an open-air State service on Parliament Hill here on the day of the funeral does not seem feasible. In the first place, the administrator of the Reman Catholic archdiocese of Ottawa, Vicar-General Routhier, has already issued instructions to his clergy to have memorial services held on the bers, and are always selected with day set for the funeral; the executive great care to guard against undue of the Anglican Synod of the Dioces of Ottawa has appointed a committee composed of His Grace the Arch bishop, Ven, Archdeacon Lauder, Rev.
