LONDON, July 14.
The Daily Telegraph's correspondent with the Greek Army, says that the Greeks, to date, have captured 82 guns and 10,000 prisoners.

BISLEY, July 14.
The second final stage shooting for the Empire Match Trophy, resulted in a victory for Britain; Australia taking second place, Canada third, and India fourth.

DUNKIRK, Pa., July 14.
Capt. McIntyre and his wife lost their lives, when the barge Annabel Wilson, bound from Erie, Pa., to Port Colborne, foundered in Lake Erie, off this city. The crew clung to a small boat and were rescued.

MARSEILLES, July 14.
The charred wreckage of an aeroplane, with the incinerated bodies of two aviators lying in ashes, was found this morning near Nonancourt on the railroad from Paris to Granville. The identity of the men could not be ascertained.

LONDON, July 14.
The Constantinople correspondent of the Mail reports long negotiations between Turkey and Roumania. He believes that an understanding has been reached. Roumania wants five torpedo boats, which Turkey is willing to lend on condition that Roumania supports her.

SALONIKI, July 14.
Greek troops, to-day, occupied the town of Melnik, 55 miles north east of Saloniki, and are advancing toward the Bulgarian frontier. The Bulgarians further retreated to Kimala, close to the famous pass. The Greek commanders anticipate that the next big fight will take place on Bulgarian territory.

LOS ANGELES, July 14.
Two middle-aged youths, who played with a train whistle, are responsible for the loss of 12 lives and injury to 200 persons near here last night, when two Pacific Electric trains collided, telescoping two cars and wrecking another, at Vineyard Station, near the city limits. Many of the injured will die.

LONDON, July 14.
A Belgrade despatch says that the Serbian invasion of Bulgaria has been successful, but was confined to the district between the frontier and Kustendil line. The Serbians advanced and making good progress. The Mail's correspondent sends the following despatch: There has been no fighting since Wednesday. The weather is wet and the roads heavy. A Russian photographer, who visited the scene of the Krivopaluk battle, found evidence of the Bulgarians

having crucified, mutilated and burned wounded Serbians.

LONDON, July 14.
Four Roumanian monitors are blockading Rutchuk, Sistova, Nicolai and Lompananka (all on the Danube). According to a despatch to the Morning Post a Bulgarian gunboat and torpedo flotilla sought refuge at Sebastopol from the Roumanian fleet.

LONDON, July 14.
Heavy fighting is reported all around Klu-Kiang, province of Kiang Se, on the Yang-tze-Kiang, says a Pekin despatch to the Daily Telegraph. The fighting resulted from the occupation of the city by northern troops. The outcome has not yet been learned, but should success attend the Kiang Se troops, who number 9,000, civil war will be inevitable.

LONDON, July 14.
A despatch from Uskub to the Times says that fighting which the Bulgarians maintained for several days on the north side of Egri was terminated Friday midnight by a Serbian surprise advance which resulted almost beyond the Serbians' wildest hopes. So complete was the surprise, that under the assault, the Bulgarians crumbled away, and were chased to Patari Sea, where the Serbians seized the position, which is of the greatest strategical importance, commanding a wide section of the frontier. This capture greatly reduces the chances of the Bulgarian counter-invasion, unless General Demitrieff should be able to deliver a sledge-hammer blow with overwhelming numbers.

LONDON, July 14.
The Second Reading of the Home Rule Bill was discussed in the House of Lords to-day. Lord Lansdowne introduced a motion, which says that "his House declines to proceed with consideration of the Bill until it has been submitted to the judgment of the country. The Marquis of Crew, moving the second reading, remarked that the Government regarded the Lansdowne motion as a demonstration against the Parliament Act, rather than as one against the Bill. Lansdowne said that if the House read the Bill a second time it would be tantamount to accepting the principle of that act, and would be an acquiescence in the treatment accorded the House, which, in his opinion, could not be done without loss of self-respect. He invited the Government to withdraw the Bill from the operation of the Parliament Act, to dissolve, and refer it to the electors by means of a referendum. The Opposition, he promised, would accept that verdict.

Committee Making Great Preparations.

A most enthusiastic meeting of the Bell Island Regatta Committee was held on Friday evening, the 11th inst. at Wabana Hall, the President, Mr. C. F. Taylor, occupying the chair, and there being present Vice-President C. Maine; Secretary, J. M. Greene; Treasurer, R. Proudfoot; and the following members: Messrs. A. McDonald, H. Thompson, C. Archibald, F. Jardine, R. Pine, A. Murphy, M. Dunne, L. Murphy, N. Sheppard, R. Burnham, D. Steele and J. Kavanagh. The routine business was first disposed of, after which the collectors reported that they would be heard from during the week, when their final results would be known. The sub-committee appointed to nominate the Honorary Members for this year submitted their report which was adopted by a vote of eight to seven. The following therefore were elected Honorary Members for this year: Mr. Thomas Cantley, Mr. D. H. McDougall, Mr. E. E. Chambers, Mr. T. A. Bown, Mr. F. Burrows, Rt. Hon. Sir Edward Morris, P.C., Mr. J. M. Kent, K.C., Hon. John Harris, Mr. Arthur Hiscock, Mr. J. B. Martin, Mr. W. J. Higgins, Mr. Frank McNamara. The splendid silver cup, donated by Mr. A. Hiscock, President of the St. John's Regatta Committee, was presented to the committee by the President. A vote of thanks was tendered the donor for his generosity. After much discussion it was decided to cancel the race to be called the "Inter-Club Cup Race" for which Mr. Hiscock's cup would be competed. The Club winning the cup this year to own it permanently. It was decided to accept the application of the City Band for the furnishing of the music at the Regatta and the Ball. It was also decided to ask for extra police protection for Regatta Day. Several matters in relation to the race course were disposed of and the committee are pretty well in shape for the regatta, on Saturday July 26th.

Complaint Against the I.C.R.
Another glaring and deliberate attempt to drive the Reid Mfd. boats away from this port, was manifested one day last week, when the I.C.R. point blank refused to handle some fifty-three cases of fresh fish that arrived the same morning from Newfoundland and which were billed to parties in the United States. This is not the only instance where fresh fish, consigned to Halifax, Boston and New York, was treated in the same way, and allowed to remain on the terminus wharf or in the shed for twenty-four hours and upwards. The shipment of fifty-three cases above referred to, arrived on the Bruce last Wednesday morning, all pleadings and entreaties by the express people were futile. The I.C.R. officials were obdurate. It was not because the steamer arrived here behind time, because she was docked shortly after 5 o'clock, two hours before the morning train departed. The fish, of course, were shipped by express, and was supposed to have the preference, if any, over other shipments. Naturally, one would expect that in the summer months fresh fish destined to such a far-off port would be rushed forward with all possible dispatch; but in the case of fish shipments coming from Newfoundland, it would appear that the People's Road deliberately tries to hold up such shipments when coming by way of North Sydney, and the result not only means ruin to the owners of the fish, but it gives such a black eye to the town of North Sydney that further shipments may be curtailed.—N. S. Herald.

Found Black Foxes In Woods.

During the past several days two or three batches of foxes have been captured by young men living in the rural districts. The latest to be reported was a young man named McKenzie, who came upon a litter of eight pups in the woods at New Campbellton. Not realizing the value of the furry little creatures McKenzie only held on to two that looked like coal black ones, and started off toward his home. However, he remembered reading something about the value of foxes, and at once started to retrace his steps. When he reached the place, however, he was only in time to see the mother of the pups make off with the remaining ones. Since the capture McKenzie has received several offers for the foxes but he has decided to hold on to them. Another batch of eight were caught by two young men who reside at Little Bras d'Or and the Gannon Road. The animals are now at Little Bras d'Or, and it is likely they will form the nucleus of a ranch at that place.—Halifax Recorder, July 11.
