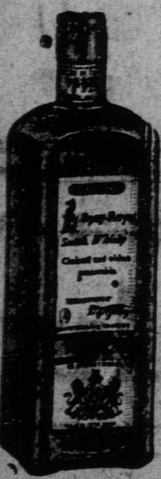

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## WOMEN CURED AT HOME

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## BY CABLE

Special to Evening Telegram.—  
WASHINGTON, To-day.  
General Carranza telegraphed Secy. Bryan from Chihuahua that the Constitutionalists would not enter into any formal agreement for the establishment of a neutral zone around the oil wells at Tampico. He said so far as his forces were concerned the Oil Companies could resume operations without fear of molestation.

WASHINGTON, To-day.  
Assurances of peace with a steady abatement of war is the dominant feature in the Mexican development here. Attention still centers on the work of the South American mediators, who report steady progress and avoidance of any deadlock between parties; in other quarters, however, the failure of Carranza thus far to accept the mediators' proposal for a suspension of hostilities against Huerta causes a doubt over the outlook for broadening the scope for the mediators' work to a settlement of the whole Mexican situation.

LONDON, To-day.  
Although politics are ruled out at the annual meeting of the Newspaper and Press Fund, over which Asquith presided last night, the Premier was not allowed to get through the opening sentence of his speech without an interruption, apparently from a male suffragette. The Premier, at the outset, explained that he would have hesitated before accepting Lord Burham's invitation, when it was received several months ago, had he foreseen the course of history. At the juncture, a guest rose and began "How Dare You." The remainder was drowned, as he was promptly ejected. Asquith's speech was devoted to a tribute to Journalists, both parliamentary and otherwise. He declared that his wide personal experience had led him to conclude that the power of the British Press was in the main exercised with characteristic national love of fair play and generosity. Lord Moulton, speaking for the House of Lords, said that if the public wanted to appreciate eloquence they would do better to read reports rather than attend debates.

LONDON, To-day.  
Lansdowne, speaking at a Primrose League gathering made it clear that he entered the conference with the Government and Nationalists with a firm determination that any time limit to the exclusion of Ulster is an impossibility. He has observed after three years working of Parliament that the nation was beginning to realize what he under that Act meant. The Act was so constructed as to render amendments after the first session impossible and consequently the Commons' Committee stage was omitted. Finally it is now suggested that the United Kingdom be split into an unspecified number of fragments under a federal scheme. It was intimated that when the constitution of the country was practically under suspension, the Government would not raise its finger to fulfil a solemn pledge given three years ago, when it, deprived the country of the protection of a Second Chamber, that it would couple the Parliament Act with a reconsideration of the powers and composition of the House of Lords. The result would be civil war if the Home Rule Bill was passed and grave trouble if it was not passed. The Government, said Lord Lansdowne, had made two colossal blunders, one being its capitulation to Nationalists, the other its vacillating treatment of Ulster. To allow the creation of an efficient force in Ulster and then order naval and military movements was tantamount to a complete collapse. When the plot failed, the Government charged the Unionists with having corrupted the army, but the only corrupting force was when the Government interdicted officers with regard to their behaviour, if they were ordered to fight Ulster. He described the late Ulster situation as a grotesque proposal. The only exclusion which Ulster would accept was one not terminable without Ulster's consent.
