## Russian War Correspondents.

On Saturday we pointed out that the news sent from correspondents bore on its face signs that all kinds of street rumors were being sent as genuine news. We pointed out that the story of the decisive Russian victory at Lodz was not confirmed by any official news from Petrograd, Paris or London. An unpleasant confirmation of our surmise came to hand last night, when instead of a confirmation of a decisive Russian victory at Lodz, it was officially announced from Berlin that the Germans had occupied Lodz. Newspaper correspondents in the Eastern theatre of war have earned a most unenviable reputation during the present war. The stories of German army corps surrendering, being routed, and in dire straits have not been confirmed by the Russian War Office. In the earliest stages of the war these correspondents were even worse than they are now, for the number of Austrians they reported killed, wounded and captured was sufficient to reduce to nothing, greater numbers than the Austrians ever had in their army. Indeed, the wonder grows as the casualties increased, where the Austrians were getting the men to keep up the fight. If it were not that we have the solemn assurance that vodka has been absolutely barred in Russia since the war began, we might be inclined to hazard the guess that these correspondent reports are written in the vodka's shops. One matter, however, is absolutely clear, stories of correspondents in Russia about the Russian war office will not allow any correspondents to go to the front, and it is clear they do not allow them to know what is going on.
