The Small Investors.

The British Government has taken a leaf out of the book of French finance with advantage. For a long time it has been the settled policy of France to encourage the small French investor to put his money in Government Funds, and this practice has had a notable effect on French thrift, which is the most marked of any nation on earth. It is indeed said that the quick recovery of France from the enormous levy made by Germany after the Franco-German war in the shape of an indemnity may be traced to this cause. Great Britain in the past has done very little in this direction. She has built rather with the big investors through the Bank of England. In floating the last war loan a few days ago, she made special arrangements through the Post Office banks and the Trade Union organizations to appeal to the working class, evidently arranging for the holding back of the big investors. The response has been prompt, and according to a message last evening most gratifying. The Evening Standard stated last evening that up to noon yesterday \$750,000,000 of the loan had been applied for, and that the present flow of subscriptions is mostly for small or moderate amounts. Not only are the workers volunteering freely for the trenches, but they are coming forward freely for the munition factories, and are showing equal readiness in putting their savings at the disposal of the Government. There is no room to doubt the statement that a veritable "revival" has struck the home-land, that the people are bending their backs to the mighty task before them and that they intend to see it through. It is a fight to a finish.

Germans Build Big Battleships.

REPORTS FROM HOLLAND SAY THEY ARE TO BE ARMED WITH SEVENTEEN INCH GUNS.
London, June 22.—The Daily Mail's naval correspondent commenting on the reports from Holland that the Germans are rushing to completion several new battleships armed with guns up to 17-inches, declares that victory in naval warfare in the present campaign has gone uniformly to the biggest guns, and urges the British Admiralty under no circumstances to allow the Germans to gain ascendancy in this respect.

WENT BACK FOR GLASSES; CAPTURED A WHOLE TRENCH.

London, June 16.—In an address at University College, last night, Professor J. H. Morgan told a remarkable story of the winning of the Victoria Cross.

A young subaltern had a pair of binoculars of which he was very proud, and he bored everybody by exhibiting them. The subaltern and others in the trenches were on one occasion driven back by the Germans and went into the support trenches. Suddenly the subaltern cried: "Good

God," and ran back to the trench they had left, which was then in possession of the enemy. A sergeant who followed him came back shortly afterward to the commanding officer and said: "He has captured the trench, sir."

The commanding officer obtained some support and went to the trench, where he found the subaltern, with a revolver in each hand, standing before a whole row of Germans who had laid down their rifles and were holding up their hands.

The commanding officer afterwards

said to him: "You will probably get the V. C. for that, but it was a very foolish thing to do to try and recapture a trench single-handed."

"But," replied the subaltern, "I went back for my binoculars."

War News

Messages Received Previous to 9 a.m.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, June 25.—The French Government comparative calm along the front, captured positions being gained. About 700 prisoners been taken in the Ficht region the 14th.
The Russian Government the attempted German advance in the direction of Sverdlovsk and checked. Also desperate fighting the Dnieper, the enemy suffered enormous losses. On the left bank the Dnieper, the Austrians were pushed, losing about 1,750 prisoners. The Italian report is satisfactory.

FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, June 25.—In Lorraine the enemy yesterday on two different occasions endeavored to retake positions he had lost. Leintrey, but was completely repulsed. In the Vosges two German fantry attacks were checked by artillery and infantry fire. were delivered against our troops at Reichskerskopf after a violent artillery bombardment. German tanks yesterday threw five bombs the Sanatorium at Zuydcoote without doing any real damage.

ITALIAN PROGRESS.

UDINE, Italy, June 25.—Slowly, owing to the difficult mountain warfare, but steadily with grim determination, Italian forces are advancing both from the south through the Predil Pass towards Tarvis, which is the pivot of the classical roads along which every great invasion of Austria has occurred. From Italy, which is about five thousand high, heavy artillery of the Italians has been sweeping the valley as far as Plezzo which lies four miles away in a direct line. Big guns dominate the whole valley of the per Isonzo River and threaten it all.

SUBMARINE OFFICER HONOURED.

LONDON, June 25.—It is officially announced that the Victoria Cross has been awarded to Lieutenant-Commander Smith, for taking a submarine in the Sea of Marmara and sinking Turkish transport and a gunboat. Two officers of the submarine were awarded the Distinguished Service Cross each, and the crew were Distinguished Service Medals.

MAIL FOR NEUTRALS.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—No protest will be made by the States against the interference of American mails passing through the neutral belligerents' territory for trials. Since the belligerents are not allowed to censor cable messages sent through their territory, it is here taken the position that it would seem to be subject to the risks. Postmaster General Bur has ordered that the mail to not be sent by ships which do not stop at the ports of the belligerents.

SALVAGING THE TUNISIA.

LONDON, June 25.—Arrangements were made for salvaging the steamer Tunisia which was torpedoed off Lowestoft Wednesday last by a German submarine. After being hit, the Tunisia was beached nearby and the landed.

MEXICO AND UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, June 25.—The Foreign Chancelleries in Mexico in the Mexican situation have given to understand that President Wilson is determined to stand in a line with his recent statement as to Mexican affairs, after turns from the summer White at Cornish, New Hampshire, a week in July.

NEW WAR LOAN.

LONDON, June 25.—The sum of \$750,000,000 in numbers of the new war loan has been applied for by the London alone up to noon to-day, according to a statement published in the Standard. Very large applications in other words requests for loans, is being held back until the week. The present new applications are mostly for small amounts.

LONDON REVIEW.

LONDON, June 25.—Along the most crucial section of the Dnieper battle front in between Zuvavna and Halicz, fighting is going on, and there is conflict over the situation, according to official reports. The
