At yesterday's session of the Assembly the Government Model Farm came in for some severe criticism. According to the plan adopted the male cattle would be sent to the different districts during the summer and in the fall they would be shipped back to headquarters. Out of the 47 heand of cattle now at the stables 18 breeding animals would be disturbed in this way during the coming summer he said. Another fact brought out by the discussion was that nearly 2 million dollars worth of agricultural produce are imported every year.
