Inter-Imperial Trade.

Dealing with inter-Imperial trade, Sir Richard Squires quoted the changed trading relations between Sewfoundland and Great Britain as in illustration of the disturbing in-Reences of the Great War. Refere he war (he said) Newfoundland's rade went largely to Great Britain and Europe. During the war, howover, owing to the difficulties of trans-Atlantic traffic, extensive trade was leveloped with the United States, and was still maintained. But this new trade relationship does not appear to he altogether satisfactory from Newfoundland's point of view. "The balance of trade between the United states and Newfoundland," Sir Richerd Squires explained, "is at present largely in favor of the United States. That is, we sell little to the United States, but buy substantial quantitiof American products."

There, instead of the one great depressing institution, the cottage plan has been adopted, each one a home, each supervised by a person who takes the place, of a father or a mother, and situated in surroundings that enable the members of the family to pursue occupations that are interesting, and that in future years will be of great benefit to them. By the adoption of some such plan great stimulus could be given to the development of a real live agricultural ndustry, and the plan might be further extended to include work which would give the boys a thorough knowledge of forestry.
