The Markets

WHEAT IMPROVES; PRICE IS STRONGER IN WINNIPEG

Continental Markets Better; Cash Demand Good; American Markets Bouyant

Winnipeg, May 10.—There was an improved tone in the wheat markets and prices were decidedly stronger. The influencing factors were a better continental demand, strong cash demand at Minneapolis and need of rains over the northwestern states, while unfavorable weather was reported in France. The Liverpool market was closed for the Whitauitide holidays. Winnipeg opened unchanged to 1-2c higher and closed with a gain for the day of 3-8 to 1-8c.

American markets opened unchanged to 1-2c higher and showed strong demand for the business hours. Minneapolis opened 1-3 to 1-2c higher and closed 7-8 to 1c higher. Chicago opened unchanged to 1-8c higher and closed 7-8 to 1c higher.

The cash demand at Winnipeg was not good and offerings fair while export business was inactive. Cash prices closed 1-2 to 3-4c up for contract wheat; lower grades dropped 1-2c. Oats and flax were both stronger. Oats closed unchanged to 1-4c up. Flax closed 2-4c higher on all grades. Inspections Friday were 4- cars and in eight Saturday were 600. Clearances were: wheat 50,000 bus.; oats 58,000 bus.; flax 15,000 bus.

MAJORITY REPORT FAVORS MEN

Ottawa, April 27.—The award of the Board of Conciliation under the Industrial Disputes Act, to inquire into differences between the Canadian Northern railway and its conductors has been received in the Department of Labor. The board was composed of William Cross of Winnipeg, appointed on the recommendation of the employees, and His Hon. Justice C. N. R. J. N. Harvey of Toronto, appointed on the recommendation of the employers. Mr. Justice was chairman, appointed on the recommendation of the other two members.

The demands of the conductors were for several changes in the existing schedules of miles and rates, including an increase in pay and a reduction of working hours from nine to eight hours per day. The number of men directly concerned is 450.

The board in its report, which is signed by its chairman, Judge Haggart, and Mr. Hall, recommends the adoption on July 1, 1913, of a new schedule, which provides for the payment of passenger conductors, at the average of \$165 per month, conductors on mixed and freight trains at \$180 per hundred miles, and conductors on through freight and work trains at \$125, the new rates involving certain increases on those now prevailing. The proposed new schedule also provides that, except in extreme cases, Mr. Hall, while signing the board's report, in which it is claimed that the new schedule should be made effective from January 16 last, and also that the mileage rates in some cases are inadequate. A minority report is presented by Mr. Cross.
