**The Year's Record.**

The annual meeting of the Women's Christian Temperance Union was held in the Union rooms, Dundas street, yesterday afternoon, the president, Mrs. Margaret, in the chair. Secretary Miss E. Slight read her annual report. It was carefully compiled and comprised a concise record of the union during the year. The Hospital Committee and its work came in for much attention. More workers in that department are greatly wanted to make the committee as efficient as it should be. Regular visits to the hospital had been made and fruit and flowers carried to the patients, who had always shown pleasure in being thus noticed. Several conventions had been held. The evangelistic department of work, which had for its object the reclaiming of drunkards and the assisting of their families, had been productive of much good. The report, showing a cash balance to the union's credit of \$104.84, was read and adopted. A communication from the Evangelical Baptist Church regarding the proposed temperance campaign in the city was read asking their co-operation. The election of officers resulted as follows: Honorary president, Mrs. Margaret; president, Mrs. Thornley; recording secretary, Miss Slight; treasurer, Mrs. Darch, and financial secretary, Mrs. Winnett. The vice-presidents will be the wives of city clergymen connected with the union.

**London Presbytery.**

At the London Presbytery Conference on the State of Religion held in Knox Church, St. Thomas, there were present: Rev. A. R. Belmont (presiding), George Sutherland, D. Cameron, J. Currie, Alex. Henderson, W. M. Roger, F. Ballantyne, E. H. Sawyer, Thomas Wilson, J. E. McLaren, T. K. Gundy, G. A. Francis, R. C. Simpson, M. P. Talling, and Messrs. D. K. McKenzie, J. Smith and J. Scott. Rev. J. B. McLaren introduced the topic, "The prayer meeting, how to make it interesting." The subject was discussed by Rev. John Currie, of Kintore, introduced the subject, "Family religion and the best methods of promoting it," and Rev. G. A. Francis, of Bonny, "The Sabbath." A deep interest was manifested in the discussion which took place on the different subjects. At the regular business meeting of the Presbytery Rev. E. H. Sawyer was appointed moderator for the next six months. Mr. Monteith, at present assistant pastor of Knox Church, St. Thomas, read a discourse on Zachariah the Prophet. On motion he was certified to Knox College. Rev. Dr. Thompson, of Bethel, resigned his charge on account of ill-health and sickness in his father's family. There had been some difficulty in the congregation, but at a meeting held the majority present were anxious that he should not press his resignation. Some 151 signed a petition for him to remain, and 20 refused to sign it. It was decided to let the resignation on the table till the next meeting of the Presbytery, and Messrs. T. Ballantyne, A. Henderson and Campbell were appointed a deputation to visit the congregation and report. Application was made for leave of absence for Rev. W. H. W. Boyle, pastor of Knox Church, till May next, on being ill. Granted. Rev. J. A. Brown was appointed interim moderator. Rev. F. Ballantyne reported from the Committee on Rearrangement of the congregations of Alliance Presbytery (Windsor) and the committee from Sarnia Presbytery and agreed to meet the several congregations concerned. Carluke was unanimously agreed to and the majority of Alliance Presbytery were opposed to the change. The joint committee then determined to let the matter drop.
