London Dec. 17.—The announcements in the day papers respecting the time and place of the royal wedding are the purest speculations, for none of the arrangements have yet been seriously discussed by the Queen and the Prince of Wales, with whom the decision practically rests. It is understood that Parliament will be asked to vote a small allowance for the future Duchess of Clarence. This motion is not likely to be seriously opposed, for the Duke and Duchess will have only \$100,000 a year, whereas each of the younger sons of the Queen began married life with a Parliamentary allowance of \$125,000 and all had other resources. It will also be necessary to make provision for the future Duchess of Clarence in the event of her husband's death, as he has nothing whatever in his power, and his income from the fund which was granted by Parliament in 1889 for the family and the Princess of Wales is only for his life.
