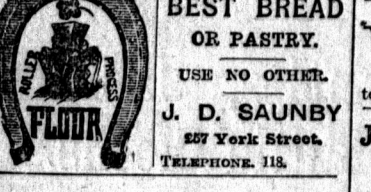

THE WEATHER PROPHECY.
TORONTO, Jan. 12—11 p.m.—The storm mentioned yesterday is now central over the Bay of Chaleur. It has caused a general gale throughout Eastern Canada, accompanied by snow in Quebec and Northern New Brunswick, and rain in Southern New Brunswick and throughout Nova Scotia. Fine weather now prevails in Ontario and Quebec. An important depression covers the Northwest, accompanied by higher temperatures and local snow falls. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 20°—22°; St. Appelle, 20° below—22°; Winnipeg, 18° below—20°; Port Arthur, 1°—2°; Toronto, 12°—14°; Montreal, 14°—16°; Quebec, 20°—22°; Halifax, 12°—14°.

LOCAL TEMPERATURES.—Highest, 23°; lowest, 21°.

TORONTO, Jan. 13—10 a.m.—The indications for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes region (covering the peninsula and as far west as Belleville) are Fair, decidedly cold weather, with light local snow falls.

—Almost around the festive board

—Miss Clara Wheeler, of Dundas street, has gone on a four months' visit to relatives in Thorold.

—The Sisters of St. Joseph will seek to have their taxes for 1890, amounting to \$156 80, remitted.

—Special evangelistic services will be held in the Wellington Street Methodist Church this week.

—Quite a number of cases of diphtheria exist in the city at present. Most of them are of a mild type.

—The pulpit of King Street Methodist Church was supplied Sunday by Mr. I. M. Mayell, of this city.

—The stock of D. Watt, of Watford, which was offered for sale by W. Y. Brunton, has been withdrawn.

—Gussie Lawless, the former Londoner charged in Detroit with infanticide, has been examined and bound over to the Recorder's Court.

—The city rinks were all unusually well patronized on Saturday. Excellent band

music enlivened the amusement of the skaters.

—Rev. Arthur Browning, who has been here on a visit to his brother-in-law, Mr. I. M. Mayell, left for Toronto to engage in evangelistic work.

On Sunday evening the Salvation Army dispensed with their Market Square meeting. The evening's programme was varied with a route march.

—Rev. Mr. Bone, Welland Canal missionary, occupied the pulpit of the Knox Church Sunday, giving a review of his 23 years' work among the sailors.

—The anniversary services of the Queen's Park Methodist Church were held Sunday. The sermons were preached by Rev. George Boyd and Rev. C. T. McIntyre.

—The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed in the King Street Presbyterian Church Sunday. Twelve persons were received into the fellowship of the church.

—George Quinlan, an old resident of London, and a prominent member of the Orange Association, died of old age and general debility at the City Hospital Sunday morning.

Memorial hymns were sung by the choir of Christ Church Sunday in memory of the late Miss Chalcraft, who died recently. The deceased was formerly a member of the choir.

—The negotiations between Mr. S. Cameron and Mr. Oag, of London, for the transfer of the Russell House to the latter, were concluded on Tuesday, Mr. Oag taking possession on Wednesday. (Napanee Beaver.)

—Miss Rotta Chute has given up her charge of the choir of the Charles Street Methodist Church, Ingersoll, and will devote her time to her pupils and concert engagements. Miss Chute is a favorite with all audiences.

—Rev. Gowan Gilmore, of the mission station North Bay, preached in Christ Church Sunday morning. In the afternoon he addressed the pupils of the Sunday school, giving them an interesting account of his work among the residents of that place.

—Nearly the whole Italian colony flocked to the Police Court yesterday with the expectation of hearing a local trouble ventilated. Margherita Onto, a repossessing young married woman claims to have been assaulted by Monzette Nisi, a woman of mature age. As the lawyer for the defense was unable to attend, the interpreter asked an adjournment until Tuesday, which was granted.

A Book Agent's Trouble.
Frederic J. Swill, a book agent who claimed at the Police Court yesterday that Malcolm E. Wilson had in July last without any warning caught him by the throat, stopped his wind, and ordered him out of his (Wilson's) premises. For this he brought an action for assault seven months later, whereas the law provides that such an information must be laid within three months. Mr. Love, for the defendant, maintained that it was no offense to choke off a book agent's wind, and read a letter in which it appeared that Lewis owed Wilson some money and threatened law proceedings if the defendant did not cease to dun him. The case was dropped by the magistrate.

Death of Mr. John Kennedy.
A correspondent writes: "John Kennedy, one of Hamilton's most respected citizens, died this morning after a lingering illness. Deceased was a native of London, England, and came to Canada in 1877. The opening service of the new London North Mission in connection with the Queen's Avenue Methodist Church transpired Sunday afternoon, the cosy little building being well filled. Rev. Geo. Boyd preached an appropriate sermon from Psalm, xlviii, 2, after which Messrs. Geo. Robinson and T. G. Whitaker formally presented the church for dedication, the associate services of which was conducted by Rev. Dr. Sanderson. Rev. Dr. Evans pronounced the benediction. The collection amounted to about \$22. On Tuesday evening a tea meeting will be held in the building, and on the following evening the children will have a special treat of the same description. The land for the mission was the gift of Mr. Thos. McCormick, while the building was contributed by Messrs. Robinson and Whitaker.
