Suspicious Evidence Against the Man in Stratford Jail.

The Valise Identified-He Had Some Weman's Clothing on His Person,

CHATTELLE NOT YET IDENTIFIED. LISTOWEL, Gat., Oct. 24.—Although a majority of the persons who were expected to have identified the man Chattelle as the ramp seen in the immediate vicinity of the Keith murder decided without hesitation that he was not the person, it is rumored that very strong circumstances point to his beeing the guilty party. Nothing can be learned at present, however, except that this morning Detective Murray proceeded to Stratford, whither Chattelle was taken last evening, carrying with him the clothing found in the valise on Sunday near the murder to compare it with that found in the parcel the prisoner had with him just before the arrest and also to ascertain whether the valise was that reported to have been stolen at Ailaa Craig.

THEY THINK HE'S THE MAN. STRATFORD, Oct. 24.-It seems more than likely that the authorities have safely lodged in Stratford jail the man responsible for the horrible murder of Jessie Keith, Alameda Chattelle, the French-Canadian, brought here yesterday afternoon, when arrested threw away a parcel containing articles of woman's clothing. When searched at the jail here it was discovered that he was making use of other such articles in lieu of underwear.

On Oct. 3 last a black valise, such as found in the bush where the tragedy occurred and containing such articles as were described to be its contents, was stolen from a Mrs. MacLeod, of Ailsa Craig, and this morning, on arriving here, she IDENTIFIED THE VALISE

wrapped around the dead girl's neck, as well as the articles found in possession of the prisoner when arrested as her property. The Tam O'Shanter hat the prisoner wore was also identified as having belonged to her husband. Other witnesses from Ailsa Craig identified the prisoner as having been in that place on the date mentioned and the witnesses from the locality of the murder identified him as having been seen carrying the valise and as having heen near the scene on Friday last.
