Late Canadian News.

Project to Start a New Presbyterian Church in Ottawa.

Timber Limit Sold for \$310,000.—The wealth of the late Mrs. Slater, Hamilton, placed at \$291,496.

Mr. Duncan McIntyre is again critically ill at Montreal, and his recovery is not expected.

Lord Aberdeen's new electric yacht was launched on the canal at Ottawa Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. C. A. Mayberry, wife of the Principal of Stratford Collegiate Institute, died on Tuesday.

The wife of C. E. Parker, of Windsor, whose family was poisoned last week, is very low, and it is doubtful if she can recover.

Mrs. Van Tassel, one of the oldest residents of Hastings county, died Tuesday night in the township of Huntingdon, aged 87 years.

An order has been granted for probate of the will of the late Mrs. Esther Slater, of Ottawa. The value of the whole estate is sworn at \$221,496.

A project is on foot to establish a new Presbyterian Church in Ottawa with Rev. T. W. Winefield, chaplain to the Governor-General, as pastor.

A Windsor dispatch says Jos. Truskey, the murderer of Constable Lindsay, has now fully recovered from the effects of the shot he fired at himself at the time he was arrested.

A Windsor dispatch says: Several passenger trains on the G. T. R. branch lines have been canceled, and one local freight train leaves and arrives at Windsor every other day.

Mr. Thos. Brodie, president of the Quebec Board of Trade and a member of the firm of W. & R. Brodie, four merchants, died on Thursday. He was one of Quebec's prominent and enterprising citizens.

The Klerk timber limit on Bear Creek, north of the Ottawa River, was sold to Gleghrie Bros., of Braxside and Carleton Place. The price paid for 521 square miles was in the neighborhood of \$310,000.

The session of Oak Street Presbyterian Church, Toronto, Wednesday night extended a call to Rev. J. Archer Morrison, of Listowel. The pastorate became vacant by the resignation, ten months ago, of Rev. J. M. Cameron.

Capt. Maisonneville, who lately resigned as commander of the car boat Great Western at Windsor, was presented by the Grand Trunk Railway with \$550 in recognition of faithful services while in the employ of that company during the past 34 years. The amount named is equal to six months' salary.

E. J. Skelly, Hamilton, who keeps an employment agency, proposes to sue the Herald newspaper for damages for libel. The alleged libel was contained in an article in Monday evening's issue, in which Skelly was accused of receiving money by false pretenses. The paper refuses to retract anything.

THE FOURTH FIRE
That Had Started in Dr. Talmage's Tabernacle.

The First Three Received Little Notice—All Caused by Electric Wires.

NEW YORK, May 23.—The fire which a week ago destroyed the Brooklyn Tabernacle was the fourth in the building since its erection. Trustee and ex-treasurer John Wood gave this information to a reporter:

"The fire was not the first, but the fourth one in the building. The three previous fires all started from the electrical resistance box, or converter, through which the motor wires ran from the starting box at the right of the organ desk to the motor in the organ pit.

"The first fire started before the Tabernacle was open two months. There was a lot of loose pieces of lumber around the organ desk, which were placed on the platform where the organ trackers were. The box burned out and set fire to this trash. It was extinguished, I think, by Sexton Dey, and no material damage was done.

"The second fire was caused by Organist Browne turning on quickly the full force of the current, which should be turned on by degrees at the starting box, by the organ keyboard. The resistance box was instantly burned out, and with it the wire away into the starting box. The fire flew out there, and if I am not mistaken, Mr. Browne burned his fingers at the time. This did not set fire to anything.

"The third fire was almost in the same place as the second. Sexton Dey claims the last one started on that platform, and right near the resistance box."

When asked whether he had any idea that the fire was the work of an incendiary, Mr. Wood said:

"Not a particle. It started as the others did, in the electrical resistance box. I don't remember the dates of the fires 1, 2, 3, but they occurred, and were looked upon as matters of no moment at the time."

A GALT MAN MURDERED.
Shot Dead in a Quarrel Over a Dog.

A Galt dispatch says: David Caldwell, formerly with R. S. Strong, druggist of Idaho, was murdered on the 26th of April at Island Park, near Idaho.

About ten years ago the young man took possession of the ranch, which lies on the main trail to Yellowstone Park in the Beaver canyon, close to the Snake River. It would seem that for a time he had boarded with a Mr. and Mrs. Osborne and carried on the business of a taxidermist with considerable profit. Some few months ago Mrs. Osborne was desirous of learning the business, and David very willingly taught her the art.

The alleged cause of the crime is said to be a desire on the part of the Osbornes to get possession of the lucrative business he had worked up for himself. On the day in question Mr. Osborne, who had been away for some time, returned home and found fault with the manner in which he had treated his dog during his absence. According to his statement the deceased used insulting words and a quarrel ensued. He further states that Mr. Caldwell drew a revolver and accidentally shot himself, but from the position of the wound over the left eye it is considered sure that the weapon was handled by a second party. Neighbors are also said to have heard Mr. Osborne confess to having murdered him. Though the deed was committed fully four weeks ago, deceased was not buried until Saturday last, he having been allowed to remain in the snow.

Deceased was 34 years of age. His brother Robert is in Utah and John in Manitoba. His other brother, William, with his mother, resides at the Galt nurseries.

CONCISE CULLINGS.

The trial of Erastus Wiman begins in New York on Monday next.

Advices from Chili say the Government has ordered all customs duties paid in gold.

The British warships Blake and Tartan, from Bermuda, have arrived in Boston Harbor.

The West Shore Railway Company is using hard coal successfully in its locomotives.

The Republicans of Pennsylvania have nominated Gen. Hastings for Governor by acclamation.

The London Times says that nothing but the confidence of the American people, in Mr. Cleveland's sagacity, prevents a premium on gold.

A number of officers of the United States cruiser Chicago were entertained at luncheon by Lord Salisbury, at Hatfield House, on Wednesday.

Advices from China say an epidemic similar to the great plague which devastated London during the seventeenth century, is now prevailing.

Thos. Nast, the American cartoonist, for a long while a contributor to Harper's Weekly, has entered the employ of the Pall Mall Gazette. His work will be devoted to political cartoons.

The New York grand jury on Wednesday presented an indictment against Bat Shear for murder in the first degree in killing Robert Ross at the election in the thirteenth ward, March 6.

At Longview, Tex., five armed men held up the cashier of the First National Bank on Wednesday afternoon, securing \$2,500. A general fight ensued, in which three persons are said to have been killed.

A cyclone struck McKinney, Tex., on Wednesday morning. Three houses were demolished, trees uprooted, fences, signs and awnings wrecked. Lightning struck three houses and killed one man. The storm caused great damage to crops.

The State Department at Washington has granted permission to the volunteers of British Columbia to cross the border with arms and equipments to participate in the Fourth of July celebration in Seattle, Washington.

A Buenos Ayres dispatch says that Senor Salta, the Prosecutor-General, has declared in favor of delivering up Jabez Spencer Balfour, the central figure in the Liberator Building Society scandal in London, to the British authorities.

Sealers Seized.
VICTORIA, B. C., May 23.—H. M. S. Hycinthine returned to-day. Capt. May states that he seized the schooner Annie C. Moore, Favorite and Victor, a found fishing for seals in the open sea, and confiscated their guns and papers and sent them home.
