Chinese Pirates Kill Forty Frenchmen.

The Times Talks on the Venezuelan Question—Nearly 2,000 Lives So Far Sacrificed in Cuba—General Cable News.

A FREE HAND. The New York Herald's St. Petersburg correspondent says Russia at the present time is inclined to allow Japan a free hand in Korea in connection with present outbreaks.

PIRATES KILL FORTY FRENCH. Marseilles, Oct. 18.—Mail advices from Tonquin say that a French column in a fight with pirates at Panai, recently lost 40 men killed and had over 100 wounded.

LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS. Constantinople, Oct. 18.—An Imperial trade has been issued approving the scheme for the reform of the Turkish Administration in Armenia drawn by the British, French and Russian ambassadors in conjunction with the Porte.

London, Oct. 18.—The foreign office has not yet received notification from Sir Philip Currie, British ambassador at Constantinople, of the actual signing of the Armenian settlement by the Sultan. Consequently all the reports to the effect that the proposed offers have received Imperial assent are regarded as premature.

NEARLY 2,000 LIVES SACRIFICED. Madrid, Oct. 18.—It is officially announced that since the beginning of the campaign against the insurgents of Cuba the Spanish forces have lost one brigadier-general, 26 superior officers, 163 other officers and 1,811 soldiers, who have either died of disease or have been killed by the enemy.

Buenos Ayres, Oct. 17.—It is reported here that Brazil recognizes the Cuban insurgents as belligerents.

Havana, Oct. 17.—The attorney-general has demanded a sentence of death in the case of Gen. Julio Sanguilly, an Americanized Cuban, who has taken a leading part in the rebellion. It will probably be granted by the court.

In case he is freed the insurgents threaten to assassinate him. They say he gambled away a large sum which was lying in his hands in trust for the insurgents.

The insurgents at Malpaz, in the Province of Santa Clara, have captured all the mail collected at that place by the railroad station. The mail has been burned by the insurgents.

The insurgents in the Province of Santa Clara have circulated pamphlets advising the inhabitants not to use the railroads, as they have determined to blow them up with dynamite.

THE TURKS GROWL.

Constantinople, Oct. 18.—Discontent is growing among the Turks. Mohammedans declare that a storm is brewing which will sweep away the reigning dynasty and liberate Islam from the thraldom of the hated Hamidian system.

The activity at the Dardanelles continues. About 10,000 additional men are under orders to join the garrison. New batteries are building at Dardanos, Namazieh and Madjidieh, armed with heavy guns. All the flammels in town have been bought up for cartridge making, and all the whitesmiths are busy making lanterns and canteens. Many Mohammedans have been arrested in different parts of the city for using seditious language.

The London Chronicle publishes a Constantinople dispatch saying that the Sultan gave an audience to his Ministers early on Wednesday. They implored him to sign the scheme of reform submitted to the powers, and his Majesty at last gave way and consented to do so. While one part of the

populace has been pacified by the announcement of the acceptance, there is great excitement in Constantinople proper, where there are signs of strong popular feeling against it. The Soffas Mohammedan theological students are crowding together from all directions. Patrols of soldiers are stationed at every hundred yards about the city.

THE TIMES TALKS ABOUT VEN-EZUELA.

London, Oct. 18.—The Times declares in an editorial that no change has occurred in the Venezuelan question sufficing to bring it within the scope of the Monroe doctrine.

"It is begging the question," says the Times, "to assume that the British claim is for fresh territory. The British case rests wholly upon the vindication of our original right. The British contention is that, as British Guiana becomes British by right of conquest from the Dutch, the British territory extends over the whole of the possession by Holland. Every year adds to the value of a settlement in the colony within the Schomburgk line. It is no longer possible to admit any question of a curtailment of British jurisdiction beyond that line. We are now willing to submit the frontier question to arbitration, but a few years hence it will be equally impossible to submit such a question anywhere within the limits which we believe to be rightfully ours."

"It is inevitable that a note such as the United States ambassador, Mr. Bayard, presented to the Marquis of Salisbury on this question some weeks ago should be drawn almost exclusively from Venezuelan forces. It therefore requires the fullest consideration before replying. The toleration which a strong power is bound to display in dealing with weaker neighbors must have its limit, and as far as the representations may assist in inducing a settlement without recourse to unfriendly measures, they will not, we imagine, be unwelcome."

THE TURKISH OUTRAGES.

London, Oct. 18.—A dispatch from Constantinople says that the commission appointed by the Porte to inquire into the guilt or innocence of the Armenians who have been arrested since Sept. 30, have caused the release of 47 of the prisoners, who are declared to be innocent of any complicity in the massacres.

It is now stated that the number of persons who were killed during the recent troubles at Trebizond was 400. The Sultan has vainly tried to make the Russian ambassador, Mr. De Nélidoff, the Russian ambassador, to recall the Russian gunboat that was sent to Trebizond. French and Russian steamers have brought a number of refugees from Trebizond to Constantinople.

Further news of the riot at Akissar, in the vilayet of Adm. shows that the attack on the Armenians was entirely provoked. The bodies of twenty of the Armenians who were killed by Muslims were thrown into wells, from which they were subsequently removed and interred in the presence of the Armenian Bishop of Ismid. Reports from the various districts of Anatolia show that the Armenians have been disarmed, while weapons have been sent to the Moslems.

An eye-witness of the rioting at Trebizond, says that four separate Moslem mobs surrounded the Armenian quarters at Akissar, and began to pillage the shops and houses. The scene continued until 4 o'clock in the afternoon, when nothing was left to pillage and nobody was left to be killed. The better class of Turks did their best to protect the lives of the Armenians. They sheltered the women and children and many of their houses were pillaged. The Moslems only the orthodox Armenians were killed, but two non-Greeks. One of these was with the Moslems, whose resistance led to the killing of all the inmates, numbering 35. No woman or child was killed in the town.

At 5 o'clock the governor appeared on the scene and proclaimed that anybody found armed would be arrested and summarily punished. Leading Turks obtained permission for the Armenians to leave the town, where they were given a full military protection was given, it being feared there might be a renewal of the disorders during the night. An official return places the number of Armenians who were killed at 400. On the same day, Oct. 8, several villages outside Trebizond were burned and pillaged, and many persons were killed. The villages were partly looted. After matters had quieted down, the foreigners returned to their homes from the ships on which they had taken refuge. On Oct. 13, when the writer left, nearly all the foreign and native refugees had returned.

THE JAPS VICTORIOUS.

Hong Kong, Oct. 18.—Dispatches received here from the Island of Formosa announce that Takao, on the west coast of that island, was captured on Wednesday last, Oct. 16, by the Japanese. The dispatches also state that the Japanese intend to bombard Taiwan, the Chinese capital, today.

The city is held by the Japanese, who have refused the terms offered him, namely unconditional surrender, and heavy fighting is expected.

EXCESSIVE BICYCLE RIDING.

A Physician Drops Dead After Dis-mounting—A Young Man Paralyzed.

McKeesport, Pa., Oct. 17.—Dr. A. L. Black, a well-known physician of this city, dropped dead last evening immediately after dismounting from his bicycle.

Toledo, Oct. 17.—W. A. Baker, a young man employed as a stenographer by the Paragon Refining Company, who formerly lived at Clyde, rode there on his wheel on Sunday morning, a distance of 45 miles. He left here apparently in perfect health, and as he was an experienced wheelman, the trip was not one that he considered excessive. He was stricken with paralysis soon after dismounting. He is also delirious, and the doctors have little hope of his recovery.

BLUEFISH TOWED A BOAT TO SEA.

Saville, L. L. Oct. 18.—A remarkable catch of bluish was made in the ocean at Blue-Hill life-saving station by Robert and Charles Smith of this place. A school of bluish was sighted about a mile off shore, and, working to the eastward, the fishermen set a gill net. The rush of the fish was so great that the boat was carried two miles, to Water Island, before the fishermen could get control of the fish. At least half of the fish escaped, yet over two tons were caught in the net.

From Montreal to Windsor.

A Company Want Power to Build an Electric Railway.

The New G. T. R. Manager a Fast Train.

Man—A Stickler for Discipline.

A corporation known as the Canadian Electric Railway and Power Company will apply for articles of incorporation at the next sitting of Parliament. They will ask for power to build, operate and maintain an electric railway from Montreal to Windsor, running through Brockville, Kingston, Belleville, Toronto and London, and with power to build branch railways for a radius of 25 miles from the main line. They also ask leave to lease an existing road to dispose of electricity for power or heating purposes, and to have full right to perform all undertakings of an electrical company. It is not stated in the application who the promoters are.

Charles M. Hay, the new general manager of the Grand Trunk Railway, has the reputation of being a fast train man, and it is thought he will reduce the running time greatly between the large cities. He is also said to be a great stickler for discipline.

Grading was completed on the new spur on the M. C. R. at Amherstburg on Monday. Track laying commenced this week.

Third Annual Convention of the Kent County Association.

Thamesville, Ont., Oct. 18.—The third annual convention of Kent County W. C. T. U. was held here in the town hall on Tuesday and Wednesday, under the presidency of Mrs. R. P. Wright, of Dresden. A large number of visiting delegates were present. The president delivered her annual address, in which she drew attention to the fact that the W. C. T. U. of the United States had declared in favor of prohibition, and also the progress of the temperance movement in our own land. The secretary, Mrs. R. P. Wright, of Dresden, read a report of the work of the association during the year. The secretary's report showed several local unions in the county and three Bands of Hope. The treasurer's report showed the finances in a healthy condition. The reports of superintendents showed activity and industry on the part of the ladies in the numerous departments of the union. Visiting clergymen were then introduced and made brief felicitous addresses.

In the evening a public meeting was held in the Methodist Church, at which the Rev. D. M. Kennedy made an address of welcome to the union, which was responded to by Mrs. Baird. Mrs. Baird gave a very interesting paper on "A Mother's Reason for Joining the W. C. T. U." and Mrs. Sawber followed with a paper on "New Woman."
