LONDON LOST.

Guelph, Aug. 14.—The Leafs' latest acquisition, Kid Jordan, did the pitching today, and the Leafs' long drive over the fence for a home run in the ninth, the Cockneys failed to connect with the ball in a manner calculated to win games. While the visitors got the first two runs, they both came in on an error, and they failed to score again till Cockman made his lucky stab in the ninth. Kershaw was on the slab for London, and he put up a good ball until the ninth, when the Leafs got him going, and he made a disastrous throw to pin a man at second, that let in O'Brien and lost the game.

It was a fast game of ball, and the enthusiasm all through was great. Several times after the second it looked as if the leaders in the league race for the time being were the Leafs, but they were not to be. In the sixth, after a neat catch, Kershaw's ball was in one hand and quickly doubled on Jimmy at second. In the ninth, after two runs were in, Kershaw made a neat catch of Kershaw's hit, and put out Gunther, who was heading for second.

In the Leafs' second, Dark and Moore singled; Moore stole second and Dark came home, while Ward was juggling the ball.

In the fourth, Dark again scored the run, getting a base on balls and coming home on Snyder's timely hit. In the sixth, it was also Dark who crossed the rubber again, getting a pass to first, and again coming home on a hit by Boyle.
