LORD ROBERTS

Says He Hopes To Be About in a Few Days.

Boers Defeated at Vanderspan—The Lancers Do Effective Work-Kruger in France Talks Fight.

London, Nov. 22.-The following dispatch has been received at the war office from Lord Roberts, dated Jo-

hannesburg. "My horse fell with me Sunday and bruised me somewhat. Am doing well. Hope to be about in a few days."

Bloemfontein, Nov. 22.-The Boers under Brand were defeated Nov. 19, at Vaderspan, with heavy losses, the lancers charging through the flying line and doing deadly damage, as a number of riderless horses demonstrated. Brand himself was wounded. The British casualties were not serious. Cape Town, Nov. 22.-The health officer certifies that the disease prevailing at Izeli, near King Williamstown, is the bubonic plague. Another case was reported today.

KRUGER'S BLUSTER. Marseilles, Nov. 22.—Mr. Kruger is doubtless elated at the warmth of his reception by the people of Marseilles today. The fighting declaration he made at the landing-stage dispelled any impression that he might intend to accept a compromise from the British Government. His announcement was greeted with a roar of cheers and cries of "Vive Kruger," "Vive les Boers," "Vive la liberte." Mr. Kruger repeated the sentiment from the hotel balcony where, replying to the ac-clamations of the people, he said the reception given him today would do much to soothe the wounds in his heart. "The Boers," said he, "would never sacrifice their freedom. would rather be exterminated to a man.

SUDDEN DEATH

Of Sir Arthur Sullivan, Who Composed the Music of "Pinafore," "Patience" and Other Popular Operas.

London, Nov. 22 .- Sir Arthur Sullivan, the musical composer, is dead, the result of heart failure. Sir Arthur Sullivan's death was very unexpected. It occurred at 9 o'clock this morning. While he was laughing and talking to a friend he fell back and died within a few minutes of heart failure. He had been ailing for some time, but it was not believed his heart was affected. Recently he had been in better health than for some

weeks past. Sir Arthur Sullivan had been ailing since he returned from Switzerland, in the middle of September. He caught a chill there and his chest and lungs became affected. He took to his bed a fortnight ago, but was convalescing and sitting up in his bed just before he expired. The afternoon newspapers print long eulogies.

Arthur Seymour Sullivan was born in London, May 13, 1842. He received musical instruction at the Chapel Social, St. James, and at the Conservatorium, Leipzig. His operas, cantatas, etc., are too well known to need more than reference. He was a member of a large number of foreign learned and musical societies. The honorary de-gree of Doctor of Music he received from both Cambridge and Oxford. He was a Chevalier of the Legion Honor, a Knight of the Order of the House of Coburg, and had received from the Sultan of Turkey the Order of the Medjidieh. He was knighted by the Queen at Windsor in 1883.

MR. KRUGER AT MARSEILLES

Ex-President of the Transvaal Breathes Out Defiance of the British.

Marseilles, Nov. 22.-Ex-President Kruger of the Transvaal landed here at 10:45 this morning from the steamer Gelderland. The weather was beautiful and the Boer leader received a magnificent demonstration. The whole route from the landing place to his hotel was crowded with people. He appeared to be in good health, and repeatedly took off his high hat in acknowledging the acclamations of the people.

Replying to the address of welcome, Mr. Kruger spoke in Dutch, and in a low voice: but he accompanied his words with energetic movements of his hat which he held in his right hand. After thanking the committees for the warmth of the reception accorded him, and expressing gratitude for the sympathy he had received from the French government, he spoke of the war as being terrible, and barbar-ously conducted by the British. He

"I have fought with savages, but the present war is even worse. We will never surrender. We are determined to fight to the last extremity, and if the republics of the Transvaal and Orange Free State lose their independence it will be because they have lost every man, woman and child."

Two Persons Killed in Ottawa and One in Montreal.

Apparent Decrease Largely Que to Carelessness in Registration.

Toronto, Nov. 22.-Dr. Bryce, secretary of the provicial board of health has compiled a statement of the vital statistics of Ontarlo for 1899. The averages are founded upon a ten years'

During the past ten years the population of Toronto has increased on an average of 4,700 for each year. In Hamilton the births have decreas ed 156 below the returns of 1898. Dr. Bryce says that the decrease in

the birth rate is largely due to care-lessness in registration. A Toronto gentleman called on Dr. Bryce yesterday and informed him that he had just ascertained that the births of none of his five children had been registered. The gentleman explained that he had left that duty to the family doctor, who had failed to make the registra-

PROVINCE GETS \$15,000.

Toronto, Nov. 22.-A compromise has been arrived at between the Ontario Government and the executors of the late James Austin, president of the Dominion Bank, by which the government receives \$15,000 instead. \$1,800 succession duties. The estate was probated at \$72,000, but the government entered suit to recover duties on \$648,000 transferred five years before Mr. Austin's death. Similar actions are pending in the estate of Wm. Duffield, late president of the London Gas Company, and the estate of the late John Breben, of Kingston. Mr. Duffield is alleged to have transferred nearly \$500,000 worth of property, and Mr. Breben \$30,000, which would bring the Breben estate below the \$200,000 mark, thereby escaping the 5 per cent tax. Up to \$200,000 the tax is 21/2 per cent.

THE CZAR'S CONDITION.
