Is your name on or off the list?  
No one can be certain unless he personally inspects it.

The only necessary qualifications are:  
1. You are a British subject.  
2. You are 21 years of age or upwards.  
3. You reside in the city.

To-morrow afternoon and evening will be a most suitable time to examine the lists and make the necessary affidavit, which cost the voter nothing. Be sure now, and avoid disappointment on election day.

—Rev. Leonard Getz, of Red Deer, N. W. T., formerly of this city, is confined to his bed with inflammatory rheumatism.

—B. E. Hall has returned to London, Ont. Mr. Hall is engaged in giving K. O. T. M. schools of instructions in Canada. (Port Huron Times.)

**Workingmen in Ward 6 Organize.**  
A meeting of workingmen of ward 6 was held last night in the Foresters' Hall, a large number being present. Mr. John Stirling was chosen chairman, and after reading the platform stated the objects of the meeting. Addresses were also delivered by Messrs. Joseph T. Marks, H. B. Ashplant, Wm. Shore, the Patron candidate in East Middlesex for the Local House, and Mr. H. Barker, of London township. All impressed upon those present the necessity for the organization of workingmen, and stated that the old machines of the political parties having failed, it was time to secure a new remedy, which would only come through organization and independent action in all matters. A large number of names were added to the membership roll, and the club in No. 6 promises to become one of the strongest in the city. The officers were not chosen, but Messrs. Lott, Mitchell and Hensell were appointed to represent the ward on the executive.

**The Robinson-Jeffrey Affair Settled.**  
A large crowd of Police Court back-benchers expected to hear something spicy this morning in the Jeffrey-Robinson seven-shooter case. Both parties were present. Mrs. Jeffrey, with whom a great deal of sympathy has been expressed, seemed weak after her illness and was accompanied by her mother-in-law, Capt. McLaren, of St. Catharines. When the case came up the magistrate ordered the court cleared and the back-benchers filed mournfully out. A lot of whispering ensued all around, followed by a confab between the magistrate and Mrs. Jeffrey's lawyer, Mr. E. Meredith.

"Do you wish to lay complaint against this woman?" the court finally asked Robinson. The latter disclaimed the slightest desire in that direction.

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The engineer also submitted a plan, showing a district (in the center of the city) in which he thought the system should be adopted.
