AUSTRALIA A BANKRUPT

According to the Daily Mail Which

Lauds Canada.

London, Feb. 19.—The Daily Mail

publishing a series of articles to show

that Australia is bankrupt. It

points to the decreased birth-

rate, and immigration, the drought,

the heavy borrowings for unproductive

works, the old age pensions, and the

serious position of Australia. The fact

that the labor party there is as cer-

tified to have a tendency to cause

the withdrawal of capital. The Mail,

on the other hand, lauds Canada,

prophesying the largest tide of emi-

gration this year Canada, and saying

that Canada is the best field

for emigrants and investors. The Mail

has a million circulation among the

emigrating classes, hence the importance

of these articles.

To Admit Canadian Cattle.

London, Feb. 19.—Robert John Price,

Liberal member for the eastern dis-

trict of Norfolk, gives notice that he

will move an amendment to the ad-

dress in reply to the King's speech, in

which he will urge the admission of

Canadian cattle upon the same terms

as those from the Argentine

Republic are now admitted.

CANADIANS ON

THE TRIBUNAL

Canada Wants Two Out of the

Three Appointed.

THE AMERICAN COMMISSIONERS

British Government Has Taken No

Action Regarding the Matter of

Appointments.

Ottawa, Feb. 18.—It is understood

that the Dominion Government is

now urging that two out of three

British representatives on the Alaska

tribunal shall be Canadians. This

point is now forming the subject of

correspondence. If the decision should

be to limit Canada to one representa-

tive, a great many people think the

Dominion Government should de-

cline to make any recommendations,

but leave the three jurors to be chosen

by the imperial authorities. This

belief is based on the assumption that

Great Britain is to a large extent bent

upon conceding the contention of the

Americans, in order to maintain the

friendship of the United States. None

of the British representatives will be

appointed until the number of Cana-

dian commissioners is learned.

Should Canada be allowed two rep-

resentatives, Justice Armour will prob-

ably be one. Hon. Edward Blake will

be leading that he should be a jurist,

although positive statements to the

opposite effect have been made in

certain newspapers. W. F. Fisher,

chief astronomer of the Dominion,

will be scientifically retained for Cana-

da.

UNITED STATES COMMISSIONERS.

Washington, Feb. 17.—Former Sec-

retary of State John W. Foster has

been selected to take charge of the

case of the United States in the pre-

sentation of the Alaskan boundary

question to the special commission to

be appointed in conformity with the

terms of the recently confirmed Alaskan

boundary treaty. Secretary of

War Root has concluded to accept his

appointment as one of the commis-

sioners.
