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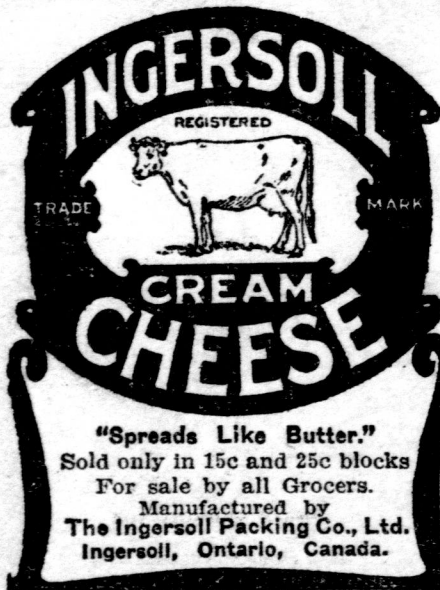

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DOG SHOW WAS A BIG SUCCESS

Dr. Wilson's "Twilight" Won the Sweepstakes Prize.

150 CANINES WERE ENTERED

Boston Terriers a Fine Class—Some Fine Bulls and Collies.

The dog show held yesterday by the London Canine Association in the city hall was the most successful ever conducted by the members, and one of the best ever held in the city.

Over 150 dogs were benched—a large number for London—and a substantial increase over last year.

Almost every class of canine was represented. And the quality was excellent. There were many dogs qualified to win in almost any sort of company.

A noticeable feature of the show, and a most encouraging one, was the number of new exhibitors. Since the last exhibition a number of the citizens of London have purchased good dogs, and are now taking a deep interest in them.

Some Good Ones.

There were many fine collies on exhibition. Col. R. McEwan, of Byron, one of the leading breeders in Canada, had some beauties on exhibition. However, in the puppy and open dogs he had to take second place to a splendid pup owned by Dr. Robinson, of the London Asylum. This fellow was a beauty, as was Col. McEwan's also.

Dr. Forster, of the Asylum, and Dan Thedy also had some fine collies. Frank McGuire also had several fine collies on exhibition.

The bulldog is in high favor at this time. There was a large entry list of the English bull, and a very large number of dogs were entered. In the English bull the competition was keen. Mr. B. C. McCann had a good dog on exhibition, as had many others. Dr. Wilson's bull bitch "Twilight" was a beauty.

In the Boston, Mr. W. O. Ruse had some fine dogs, and won many of the prizes. He has a fine kennel and should win anywhere.

"Bob" Emslie, of St. Thomas, the ball player, known to many of the oldtime London fans, and now one of the leading umpires in the National League, has time for dogs, too, and yesterday showed several Yorkshire terriers. He won a majority of the prizes in the classes, and really has some fine dogs. "Bob" took a great interest in the show, and between shaking hands with old friends and looking after his puppies he had a busy day. Dr. Ball, also of St. Thomas, showed a fine pair of Italian Greyhounds.

A Fine St. Bernard.

There was only one St. Bernard in the whole show, a big fellow, and a dog of good individuality. He was owned by E. R. Young.

The Newfoundland, a breed extremely popular a few years ago, had one good representative owned by Mr. Finch, of York street, and he was much admired.

Mr. Langley's Great Danes were the only representatives in that class, and as usual got away with the prizes.

In the Spaniel classes there were many excellent dogs. Mr. G. Tomlinson, of Woodstock, sending down half a dozen winners.

In the Ruby Spaniel class, Mr. W. Pleasance had a rare little chap, who

carried off the honors. It is a beauty, with a pedigree royal in its length.

Miss Waters, of St. Thomas, had some fine dogs, and practically swept that class.

Dr. Drake, as usual, swept the boards practically with his fine fox-terriers. Mr. Cairncross also had a beautiful pup showing.

The Poodles.

In the poodle class there were many good dogs showing. Mrs. Sainbury's French poodle winning prizes. It had many admirers.

Lev Paladino's poodle is also a wonder.

"Rags," a Scandinavian poodle, with a travelling reputation, known all over America, had a host of admirers, and he was much sought out. He is a great dog.

The best dog in the show, a competition for the cup donated by Col. R. McEwan, was won by Dr. Wilson, of Parkhill, with his magnificent bull bitch, "Twilight."

Dan Thedy's bullterrier "Stockwood-Polly Perkins" won the Western Fair bronze medal for the best terrier.

The Western Fair bronze medal for the best dog (not terrier) was won by Dr. Wilson's "Twilight."

The Dodge silver cup for the best bull bitch went to A. Williams' "Sally Bombard."

The Best Boston.

L. C. Lachie's fine Boston "Rex VII" won the bronze medal donated by Dr. Niven for the best Boston in the show.

The silver cup donated by Mr. Geo. G. McCormick for the best toy dog or bitch owned and exhibited by a lady living in the city, was won by Miss Madge Wood's "Ponto."

Miss Waters' pointer "Jingoes Della" won the special prize donated by Wm. McNeil for the best dog owned by a lady.

For the convenience of visitors, it would be well if the name of the owners of the dogs were attached to the cages.

It would add to the interest of the show.
