RECTOR GRINDS ORGAN
London Divine and His Curate, Short of Funds, Furnish Music.

London, August 2.—The parish of St. George's in the East End is so poor, and the rector, Rev. F. St. John Corbett has been so distracted to get enough money for the maintenance of his church and to help the poor of his parish, that he has truck upon a novel method of "raising the wind" which looks as if it would prove successful. He and his curate have begun playing a barrel organ at garden parties, fairs and anywhere at all where they can earn a little money.

The rector was busy turning the handle of his organ at a garden fête which he had organized when a correspondent asked him about it.

"You see," he said, "we live in one of the poorest parishes in England. It costs at least £6,000 a year to do the least we can do and I want very much more than the least. But from subscriptions we get only \$1,000 a year at the outside, so there is nothing left for us but to get the money ourselves. Fair, plays, entertainments of any sort at all that are clean, we go in for. We have more souls to deal with than in most parishes. To do our work we must have money and get money we will, even if Mr. Iselson, my curate, and I have to grind the organ day and night."

London, Aug. 2.—The Very Rev. Robert Gregory, D.D., died here today. He was born at Nottingham on Feb. 5, 1819, and since 1891 was dean of St. Paul, resigning that office on May 1 last.
