The Water Rate Reduction.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

I read with interest your article of recent date relating to a proposed reduction in London's water rates. Is it possible that your board of water commissioners has concluded that by granting a discount of 40 per cent, in place of 30 per cent, that this represents a reduction in price of 10 per cent? To be sure, the difference between 30 and 40 is 10, but this does not signify that the difference is 10 per cent. Allow me to illustrate: 100 less 30=70 formerly received; 100 less 40=60 now received. For every 70 formerly received but 60 will be received. In other words, the water board will receive 10 less on every 70, formerly received—an actual reduction in price of 14.28 per cent, instead of 10 per cent, as stated.

PRELATE PRAISES BORDEN

And Says He Has No Use for a Canadian Navy.

Kingston, Ont., Jan. 28.—Bishop Mills, in his annual charge this afternoon to the Synod of the Diocese of Ontario, warmly endorsed the naval policy of the Borden Government.

"I congratulate Premier Borden," his lordship said, "on his naval program. His position is statesmanlike and worthy of this great Dominion, and I feel that no thoughtful citizen of this country should allow any political bias to stand in the way of his support of it."

The bishop came out strongly against a Canadian-built and Canadian-maintained navy.

Referring to the "extraordinary political turnover" that occurred on Sept. 21, 1911, his lordship said: "The Conservatives, whom he had a higher respect or a more affectionate regard because of the consistency of his life."

The tribute to Premier Borden concluded with these words: "A man whom the country can trust."

KILTIES IDEA IS**POPULAR IN LONDON**

St. Andrew's Society Appointed

a Committee To Go Into the

Scheme and Report.

A REGIMENT OF 250 MEN

Cost Exclusive of What May Be Ex-

pected From the Government

Would Be Over \$5,000.

The advisability of organizing a

Highland regiment in London was

fully discussed at an enthusiastic

meeting of St. Andrew's Society held

on Tuesday evening in the Board of

Trade rooms. All the members had

good things to say about such an or-

ganization, and promised to give it

their heartiest support if a regiment

were organized. Full information was

lacking however, and the advisability

of forming a troop was left over until

a subsequent meeting, when a com-

mittee consisting of Messrs. E. Reid,

J. W. Jones, W. Buchanan, James

Gray and Captain W. K. Brown will

report as to the various items of ex-

pense, etc.

Col. Hodgins Enthusiastic.

Mr. E. V. Buchanan would not state

his full views on the question, but

was undoubtedly in favor of the re-

giment. He quoted Colonel Hodgins'

views, whom he had interviewed on

the matter. Mr. Buchanan stated

that while the colonel would not com-

mit himself on all points he was en-

thusiastic over the idea. The opinion

was of the opinion that the Federal

Government could be approached, and

the militia department. If the grant

obtained it would go a long way

towards buying equipment for the

regiment. He had sent a letter to Ottawa

with this end in view, but no reply

had been received yet. He estimated

the cost of equipping a kilted re-

giment, 250 strong, would be in the

neighborhood of \$5,000.

A Good Move.

Captain W. K. Brown, who is an of-

ficer of the Seventh Regiment, and

who has had several years' experience

in Highland regiments in Montreal,

was present, and was asked for in-

formation regarding the topic being

discussed. Captain Brown considered

the formation of a kilted regiment to

be a good move, and the part of the

Scotchmen in the city. The essential

in such an undertaking, however, was

securing capable officers to command

the regiment. He stated that twenty

officers were necessary for a body of

250 men, and that the cost of equi-

ping this number would reach \$7,500.

He advocated the use of nothing but

the drill uniforms at first. If the

regiment was not going to be a suc-

cess much money would be expended

otherwise be entailed.

A Costly Uniform.

Captain Brown then elaborated on

the cost of a suit of the Highland

regiment's garb for privates. He

pointed out that a kilt would cost

reach about \$30 per man, and the

pense as they cost between \$17 and
