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EDUCATION AND HEALTH.

Some interesting statistics have been issued by the authorities of Bryn Mawr, one of the leading women's colleges of the United States, with respect to the health of women students in residence and in answer to charges recently made that the colleges were lowering the health standard of their students by setting too great tasks and driving girls to overstudy. The figures issued by Bryn Mawr indicate pretty clearly what the faculty claim, namely, that the only time there is sickness is when the students come back from holidays at home and that their health is really at the highest point at the end of the year's work. The number of girls who left this college because of ill-health during the last seven years was ten, and in three separate years not one student had to give up work. Careful examinations by the director of physical training shows that of the senior students of the last seven years, twenty-five to forty per cent showed marked improvement in their health as a result of regular hours, plenty of exercise and the discipline of study. The number of those showing any deterioration in their general health is but small and furnishes evidence that college life tends to the strengthening of body as well as mind.

There is a growing disposition today to attend to matters of health in all schools, elementary schools, high schools and colleges. There is work being done in the public school of London today that will repay a thousand fold in future well-being all that it costs today. Children who are started in life with some knowledge of the elementary principles of health, who care for their teeth, keep clean, know how to avoid colds and other common diseases, will grow into men and women who will suffer less from ordinary ailments than does the present generation of adults. In London we might well do more of this work in our collegiate institute were the facilities what they should be, for it is at the collegiate that boys and girls pass through a critical period of their lives, both morally and physically.

In the university much attention is being given to the health of students. Western has a faculty director of athletics and physical training, and credit is given in the curriculum for the work done in the physical training classes. The university is a place where some students, if left to themselves, would spend too much time at their studies, while ignoring the

need of exercise to keep up their bodily health. With every student in Western expected to give certain hours of the week to physical training, the same as certain hours are given to mathematics or languages, there is less danger of turning out graduates all brains and no body. When statistics are available, as they will be, it will probably be found that the young men and women who are in attendance at Western University are gaining in health during their four years as a result of the stated hours of exercise, and this would be found even more true were there many of them in residence living under a special regimen.

THE RED-TURK ALLIANCE.

From sources that are authoritative comes news of an alliance between the Russian Bolsheviks and the Moslem for the purpose of driving against the British in India, middle Asia and the Near East. The Reds have reached the shores of the Caspian and the Indian borders of Afghanistan. Lenin and Trotsky know they cannot hope to convert the millions of Asia and India to their doctrine until British influence is removed. So, as a first manoeuvre towards this end, they link up with the Turk. Nothing so vividly illustrates the ruthlessness of the Russian Bolsheviks as this combination, for, of course, it will mean that the Moslem will be urged to start a holy war. If the Mohammedan world can be inflamed against the Christian to the point of general massacre it would be a situation almost impossible for the British to cope with. Lenin is a past master with the sword and the torch, but his most lurid deeds of murder and destruction would appear colorless alongside the anarchy that would engulf the entire eastern world were the Moslems to launch a jihad. Lenin and Trotsky care nothing for religion themselves and they would have no compunction in using the religious fanaticism of another race to secure the ends they seek. This diabolical conspiracy should convince those who are in favor of "giving the Bolsheviks a chance," that Bolshevism as interpreted by Lenin and Trotsky, is not possible of acceptance by decent men.

NEW HOME RULE MEASURE.

Speaking at the opening of the British Parliament yesterday, Premier Lloyd George announced that he would place before the House a revised version of his home rule measure. No doubt the recent happenings in Ireland, especially the result of the municipal elections, explains the revision. It was made clear in the Irish voting that no one faction could claim sufficient strength to be considered the dominating party. The Sinn Feiners, the elections

show, especially, were far from possessing the country as they had boasted. And the Labor party, too, no doubt, has had to be considered. It has declared the Irish question must be settled as soon as possible, and with his ear to the ground Lloyd George knows Labor's wishes dare not be ignored. English Laborites are not particularly concerned with the rights or wrongs of Ireland's case, but they realize that their own plans for social, political and industrial reforms cannot be advanced while the Irish question obstructs.

DEATH OF THOMAS GILLEAN.

The death of Thomas Gillean will be heard of with the deepest regret by the citizens of London and of Western Ontario. He was the fourth son of the late James Gillean, for many years connected with the London Advertiser. He was born in London and lived all his life here. There were six brothers, all of more than average ability, and all fond of athletic games. Tom, as he was known to every one, was equally at home in cricket and baseball. His name and that of his brother Jack, bring back memories of the old cricket field, now Victoria Park, and call back the names of Jim Jury, Dick Southam, Frank Love, Tom Browne, Billy Hunter, Frank Cooper, Jim Brown, Watson Griswold, Tom Phelan and many others among the old popular baseball players who constituted a very important part in the life of London some years ago. Tom Gillean was a good cricketer, too, a good bat, but Jack was the best bowler London ever produced.
