New York, Oct. 21.—Cozy Dolan, former New York Giant coach, who was banished from baseball with Jimmy O'Connell on charges of attempted bribery, will bring suit against Commissioner Landis and organized base-ball for alleged slander, according to announcement today by W. J. Fallon, noted criminal attorney, who has been engaged by Dolan to handle the case. At the same time, Fallon said, Dolan will make his action a basis for an attempt to clear his name, gain restoration to baseball ranks and obtain his share of the 1924 world's series money. "Dolan is an innocent man," Fallon declared. "When the true facts of the case are published and Dolan's complete testimony before Judge Landis is revealed, instead of just one sentence the public can judge for itself whether Dolan is implicated in the scandal or not.


