A Canton, N. Y., Boy Makes Serious Charge Against His Mother.

Then I learned that the house had been struck by lightning; that is to say, that the course of the discharge falling upon the hotel and wrecking it."

The latter seemed to give promise of quicker results. Dr. G. F. Kurz and Prof. Charles Brookerville, in their researches on the action of radio-active substances on various minerals, found that by mixing radium with powdered nillemite, a zinc silicate mineral, its power was increased a hundred-fold. The experimenters attributed this remarkable increased action to an undiscovered element in the nillemite, in which the increased radio-activity was multiplied.
