While in the Terminal City and subse-quently in Victoria, the minister and Com-missioner Coombe will confer respecting the labor problem of British Columbia for the purpose of devising some means by which a sufficient number of the desirable class of laborers may be induced to come West. The object of the provincial government, on whose behalf Hon. Mr. Tatlow is acting, is to interest the Sa'vation Army in the effort to solve the difficulty in which this province is placed owing to the scarcity of workmen.

The system by which the organization mentoned is able to bring many thousands of the lower but worthy classes of the Old Country to this colony every year, as explained by Adjutant White, who came West to prepare the way for his superior officer, commissioner Comple, is perfect in every detail. It is only three years since the Saivation Army took up the matter of encouraging immigration to "anada". At first they brought out 2,000 people, assisted in the payment of their transportation, and placed them in comparatively remnunerative positions. The next year they were able to increase the number to 8,000 and look after their interests in the same thorough; seroes the Atlantic under their supervision and satisfactory employment found for every individual.

Adjutant White states that the previous efforts having been so successful that the Saivation Army was determined to increase the extent of their operations this summer. Early in July they had definitely arranged with different transportation companies for the passage of no less than 25.000 home-selvers from the Old Country to the Dominion in 1908. Just what the purchase price was is not divulged, but it is understood that the vendors have accepted a greater portion of it in shares of the Consolidated company. The owners were Oliver Durant, now residing at Culpepper, Virginia, and A. H. Tarbet, of Butte, Idaho. This was one of the first claims located in the camp. It adjoins the Centre Star on the east. There is ore on the fourth, seventh, Eighth and eleventh levels of the Centre Star, practically to the lime of the Idaho, and there is little doubt that the ore bodies extend into the Idaho. Surface assays are even better than they are in the Centre Star. The Idaho will be operated at once by the purchasing corporation.
