TORONTO GUESTS AT BANQUET HERE

Attend Banquet of Star of Bethlehem L.O.L.

A DELIGHTFUL EVENT

Five hundred covers were laid last night for the Star of Bethlehem Loyal Orange Lodge banquet at the Masonic Temple, at which Imperial Lodge, 2767, and McKinley Lodge, 275, both of Toronto, were the guests of honor. No Orange gathering of this sort even approached last night's banquet, save last year's Star of Bethlehem first celebration, and the banquet last night even surpassed anything of its kind ever before attempted in London.

The banquet was not an exclusive Orange function, for 75 non-members, Wor. Master W. T. Clark stated, had places at the various banquet tables. Members of the Toronto lodges came to London in special cars over the G. T. R. They were met at the Grand Trunk station by the uniformed life and drum Orange band and the official reception committee of Star of Bethlehem Lodge, and were then conducted to Ulster Hall, where a special lodge session was held and the first degree conferred on a list of candidates.

DEPUTY GRAND MASTER.

Most Wor. Bro. W. D. McPherson, K. C., ex-M. P., deputy grand master of the Orange Association in British North America, was the chief guest of the evening, and at the lodge session was received with those distinguished honors which Orange lodges express their almost filial reverence for their chief.

Controller McGuire and Aid, Winnett, of the Toronto City Council, were also received as specially honored guests.

Major Church was expected, but his political campaign in North Toronto kept him from attending the Star of Bethlehem banquet.

The visiting lodge members were then conducted to the Masonic Temple by officials and members of Star of Bethlehem Lodge.

The banquet was served in the temple banquet hall, which was beautifully decorated for the occasion. The insignia of the three lodges, together with the flags of the empire and evergreens, were the chief features of the decorative scheme, and the tables were loaded with cut flowers.

W. T. Clark, master of the local lodge, proposed the toast of "The King," which was drunk in specially-prepared orange cocktails, followed by the National Anthem and three roof-raising cheers.

Hosts and guests then engaged in an informal sing-song, punctuated by lodge cheers which revealed the boy-spirit which dwells in the gravest of men and speeds only the touchstone of good comradeship to bring it out.

The toast to "The Orange Association" was proposed by Rev. W. B. Savage, J. W. Carson, district master, and was replied to by E. T. Essery, K. C., L. L. B., past grand master of Ontario West. Mr. Essery's speech was a masterpiece of vibrant patriotism.

THE BRITISH EMPIRE.

The toast to "The British Empire" was then proposed by George F. Copeland and replied to by the deputy grand master, W. D. McPherson, K. C., L. L. B., past grand master of Ontario West. Mr. McPherson's speech dwelt particularly on the problems facing Orangemen at the present time and reference was made to the political situation in the Dominion.

Jared Vining made a speech of welcome to the visiting Toronto lodges, which was replied to by Wor. Master W. H. Elliott, of Imperial Lodge, and by Wor. Master William Walsh, of McKinley Lodge.

Various other speeches were made by Rev. Frank Anderson, Rev. R. A. Miller, V. W. Hartnett, Aid. J. Cameron Wilson, Aid. F. E. Harley, J. B. Hay and William A. Martin. A toast to candidates was proposed by Dr. C. A. Harris and responded to by A. M. Judd and R. N. Slater.

The Harmonic Quartet rendered an

excellent program between speeches, which was enthusiastically received.

CHILD WELFARE GREAT QUESTION

Miss Mary Power Tells Catholic Women of Need of Action

100 DELEGATES PRESENT

Big Program Outlined by the Resolutions Committee

The Canadian child is the most important branch of social service," said Miss Mary Power, of the provincial health department, in an address yesterday afternoon to the diocesan convention of the Catholic Women's League, in session at St. Peter's Hall.

Miss Power sounded the keynote of the entire gathering, and of the future objective of the Catholic League, organized in the Diocese of London only eight months ago and boasting 58 subdivisions already in active organization.

Welcoming the 100 delegates to the city, Mayor Little referred to the fact that not only was this the first diocesan gathering of Catholic women in London Diocese, but the first annual convention of the league to be held in the Dominion. His words referred to the admirable stand made by Bishop Fallon for educational affiliation in this city, in identifying the scholastic institutions of his church with the Western University.

MR. MITCHELTREE GIVES HIS FAREWELL RECITAL

London Pianist Presents Delightful Program Assisted by Messrs. Warner and Webster.

Clothing his selections with rich expression and exhibiting almost perfect technique, Thomas G. Mitcheltree, London's blind pianist, achieved an artistic triumph before a large audience in Crayn Hall last night. The occasion was Mr. Mitcheltree's farewell recital before leaving for his new home in Toronto on Friday. He was accompanied by the Rev. C. Quintin Warner, cellist, and Edward Webster, baritone.

Interpreting his own compositions with those of other masters, Mr. Mitcheltree was able to express his own moods and interpret in a wonderful manner the poetry of the classics. Of particular appeal were the popular melodies, such as "Way Down Upon the Swanee River," which he rendered with his own coloring, as encores. In every selection there was ample evidence that his inability to visualize has been compensated for by a wonderful appreciation of harmony and all that is beautiful in the realm of sound. Soulful is perhaps the only word that adequately describes his performance at the piano.

Beginning with Bach's "Bourée in G. Minor," Mr. Mitcheltree summoned all the dignity and philosophy of the German master of counterpoint. In "Duetto" he brought to his aid the poetry and romance of Bach, and as a finale played "Aria and Synchrona in F. Sharp Sonata," which reflected the very essence of romance.

Mr. Webster in the second number brought out the martial spirit of "The Two Grenadiers," by Schumann. In his subsequent appearance in the sixth number his deep-throated baritone was heard to excellent advantage in "Alone in Love's Garden" (Hewitt) and in "Invictus" (Hugh).

The third number included two of Mr. Mitcheltree's own compositions, a Largo Intermezzo, by special request. In his "Nocturne" the auditor found as peaceful a mood as he had ever known in music, and the sighing of the winds and rustle of the foliage being readily distinguished. The "Barcarole" is also a tribute to nature, but the whispering of the breeze is replaced by the laughter of the rippling waters.

Negro, Welsh and Irish airs are in the group interpreted by Rev. Mr. Warner with the cello and an improvised accompaniment by Mr. Mitcheltree. The sentiment of the South is blended with the spirit of Ireland and the patriotism of Wales in this splendid group.

From the delicate and exquisite mood of "Nocturne" to the fiery march of "Polonaise Militaire" the pianist shows the wide range of Chopin. Through the valse, impromptu and prelude the musician bespeaks the mood of the composer and then in the finale he indicates the revolutionary spirit, which rises to a grand climax.

The three selections of Mr. Mitcheltree's own composition, which he offered in conclusion, were light, airy and at times fantastic. Sweeter than chimera was "The Dance of Fairies," while "Romance" called up visions of summer time and of love. The sketch of Elora Falls was charming, the shading from the sound of the water in spray to the deep rumbling of the mill being executed with an artistry that revealed the soul of the musician.

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The address of the president, Mrs. B. C. McCann, who, it is confidently hoped, will become the diocesan president at to-day's election, the secretarial report presented by Mrs. W. H. Fox, and Miss Power's address on child welfare, were outstanding events of the afternoon.

"We would have been surprised 10 years ago to know of the social service activities of the year 1921," Miss Power said. "That challenge of the Holy Father Leo, centuries ago, to look into the conditions of the working classes, sounded a summons to Catholics of the world to meet the responsibilities awaiting them. The work of child welfare has grown amazingly, and the history of social service, particularly in the church, has come from small beginnings. St. Francis of Assisi accomplished a great work, the wiping out of feudalism, through the influence of personal sanctity. Who knows but we may see the present system of capitalism overthrown by some small effort."

"Canada's war debt is our pride," Miss Power continued, "but it also is our debt. We are to replace the lives that were sacrificed we will have to see to it that the children of to-day grow up fit to fill the gap."

Citing the detailed child welfare, under the heading of child welfare, Miss Power paid a special tribute to this type of organization in London. "London is to be congratulated on its affiliation with the Western University," Miss Power remarked. "In this way we can keep in touch with the men and women graduates who are going to be particularly interested in social service."

DEPENDENT CHILDREN. "Dependent children of the province, outside of Toronto are cared for by some branch of the one organization, the Children's Aid Society," the speaker pointed out, but the dependent children are not all. There are a great number of children needing special care because of some mental deficiency. Can the Catholic League help in some small way towards the solution of this problem? There are the juvenile delinquents to assist the work of the probation officers? This is child labor, and I beg of you as an organization to prevent children from entering industry too young or too poorly equipped educationally.

"Health is a point that touches women more nearly," Miss Power said. "Every civilized nation has entered the

race for the conservation of child life, and New Zealand can boast the lowest death rate of infants under one year. In Ontario we lose 100 babies out of every 1,000 born alive, but the ultimate gain will not be the number of babies born, but the number who survive without handicap."

Concluding, the speaker urged the importance of prenatal care as proven by the 3,000 still-births registered in the province in one year. "A huge campaign faces the public health nurse in her maternal work in Ontario," she said. "The Provincial Board of Health helps out the municipalities in need by public health centers and public health nurses. It may be necessary for your subdivisions to augment what is being done along these lines, and to help in conquering the plague of malnutrition, prevalent among rural, town and city children alike."

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HITS PARKED MACHINE

Miracle How Driver of Unidentified Car Escaped Injury in Accident Last Night.

How the driver of an automobile, whose name could not be ascertained, escaped serious injury, when he crashed into an automobile, owned by Frank A. McCormick, which was parked on Wellington street, near the corner of Central avenue, is a mystery. Both machines were badly damaged, and the impact was so terrific that the steering wheel of the unknown car was broken away from the supports, the driver sitting in a dazed condition, with a death grip on the lone wheel.

Last night about 7 o'clock an auto was proceeding north on Wellington

crashed and, after it passed over Central, crashed into the parked car. The brakes were on the parked machine, but nevertheless it was pushed fully 100 feet from its original standing place. Just how the accident occurred is not known, but it is thought the driver either lost control of the car or did not see the standing machine.

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
