TORONTO, Oct. 25 .- New regulations

for the police of this city, which have just been issued, forbid constables from attending a theater, race track or other places of amusement while off duty without obtaining leave to do so. "Constables neglecting to avail them-selves of the time at their disposal for rest and sleep, and spending a large portion of their time in walking about the streets," the regulations state, "are to be reported to the chief constable. "A policeman entering a public house or liquor shop, except on duty, is liable to dismissal. The new regulations state



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
