They Consent to Do So Under the Trackmen's Protection.

Public Meeting, in Interests of Stricken Held in Toronto Junction, Addressed by Mr. J. W. St. John and Hon. N. Clarke Wallace - Letter Promise to Aid in Securing a Satisfactory Settlement With the Company.

Toronto Junction, June 26.-Last night a largely attended meeting of the striking railway trackmen and their friends was held here. Mr. J. W. St. John, ex-M. P. E., and Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, Minister of Railways and Canals, were present.

A telegram was received from the bridge men that, if offered the protection of the Order of Railroad Trackmen, they would go on strike also. They have been offered the protection of the order.

Little news at Winnipeg. Winnipeg, Man., June 26.-Locally there is little news regarding the trackmen's strike. The men are talking of holding a public meeting to discuss the situation.

AND WHEREAS the total amount required by "The Municipal Act" to be raised annually by special rate for the purpose of the said debt and interest is \$703,611.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the whole rate proposed to be levied on the said Municipality according to the last revised and equalized assessment rolls is \$23,221,707.00.

AND WHEREAS the amount of the existing debt of the said Municipality is \$27,467,511.50, part of which, either principal or interest, is in arrear.

THEREFORE the Municipal Council of the said, the Corporation of the County of Waterloo, enacts as follows:

1. That it shall be lawful for the Mayor of the said County to raise by way of loan from any person, body or bodies corporate or politic, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the debentures hereinafter mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to be paid to the Treasurer of the said Municipality for the purposes aforesaid.

2. That it shall be lawful for the said Mayor to cause twenty debentures of the said Municipality to be made for seven hundred and fifty dollars and sixty-one cents each (being the total sum of combined principal and interest payable annually \$703,611.00) and the said debentures shall be sealed with the Corporate Seal of the said Municipality and signed by the Mayor and Treasurer thereof.

3. The said debentures shall be issued and dated on the Thirtieth day of December in the present year 1901 and one of such debentures shall be payable on the Thirtieth day of December in each succeeding year respectively during the term of twenty years thereafter and the same shall be payable at the office of the Treasurer of the said Municipality in the Town of Berlin.

4. For the purpose of paying the said debt and interest the said sum of \$703,611.00 shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of the said debentures, or any of them, by a special rate sufficient therefore on all the rateable property in the several Municipalities within the said County.

5. This By-law shall take effect on the day of the passing thereof.

Passed at the Council Chamber in the said Town of Berlin this twenty-eighth day of September, A.D. 1901.

By-Law No. 51

To raise the sum of \$10,000 for the purposes therein mentioned and to authorize the issue of Debentures therefor.

WHEREAS it is necessary for the Corporation of the County of Waterloo to raise the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars for the purpose of building an addition to the Registry office in the said County and to build County bridges and in order therefore will be necessary to issue debentures of the said Municipality and to create a debt to the amount aforesaid.

AND WHEREAS it is proposed and intended that the said debt shall bear interest, payable yearly, at the rate of three and one half per cent per annum and that the said debt and interest shall be repayable by yearly sums during the term of twenty years of such amount that the aggregate amount payable in each year for principal and interest shall be as nearly as possible equal; the years in which such sums shall be payable respectively, the amount of principal and interest respectively, and the total amount of principal and interest payable yearly being as set forth in the following table, that is to say:
