WOOLWICH CO. NCL.
The Municipal Council of the Township of Woolwich met on Tuesday, June 18th, at 7 o'clock, pursuant to adjournment from last meeting.

All members present; the Reeve in the chair.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and adopted.

A communication was received from the secretary of the local Board of Health along with a copy of resolution passed by the Board of Health of the Township calling attention to section 4 of Chapter 219 R.S.O., 1897 in regard to vaccination. No action was taken on the same.

Moved by Solomon Koch, seconded by Adam Matlack, that the Reeve be authorized to open a new line of road on the north side of the Conestoga River at St. Jacobs be read a third time and passed.

By-law No. 480 was read a third time and passed.

Moved by Jacob L. Umbach seconded by James Howlett, that the assessors be paid the following amounts for the equalization of Union School Sections in accordance with section 51, Chapter 292, R.S.O., 1897, under the Public School Act:
