The Vorwaerts, the Socialistic paper of Berlin, says that already the national debt of Germany has increased to such an extent that the interest and pensions alone will reach the sum of \$625,000,000 annually, which is nearly as much as the total expenditures of the nation for 1912. It can be easily seen that if the war should continue for another year the nation would be on the sure road to bankruptcy, if not already there. No doubt Germany expected she would accomplish her purpose within a year, and that she would be able then to recoup her own finapplial losses by compulsory demands made upon her neighbors.
