a proportion of their funds to such an institution, the Hudson's Bay Company will become responsible that the sum allowed (whether it be more or less) shall be laid out in the most economical manner, and that the expenses to be incurred, shall not exceed the limits which may be assigned. Their confidential officers shall be charged to give all the assistance in their power, both in forwarding the object in general, and in superintending the application of the money which may be allowed, without making any charge against the fund for their trouble in this management.

The Hudson's Bay Company will also appropriate a piece of land for the use of the establishment, and will undertake to provide the buildings that are necessary for its accommodation. And whenever any disposition is evinced by the Indians to settle in a fixed habitation, or even in part to support themselves by cultivating the ground, allotments of land, well adapted for the purpose, will be made to them by the Hudson's Bay Company, and every facility afforded.
