Lesson from the forty-third to the forty-eighth verse of the fifth chapter of St. Matthew.

Mrs. Arnold.—Repeat the first verse of your lesson, Harriet.

Mrs. Arnold.-This was one of the gross perversions of the word of God of which the Scribes had been guilty. They taught their followers that it was their duty to love their own families and friends, and the people of their own nation or sect, so long as they were not at variance with each other; beyond this the duty was not enforced, but on the contrary they were enjoined to hate, and consequently to revenge themselves upon their enemies. I need not tell you that no such words are to be found in the Mosaic law, which in its spirit shadowed fortl: the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and in its provision for the protection of the poor and helpless, the stranger, the widow, and the fatherless, is infinitely superior to any mere human code of laws that has ever been framed : even the bondsman and the hired servant
