trade. At one office the statement is made that orders are accumulating on the books so rapidly that the lumber already called for to be deliver ed in March is equal in amount to that sold in February, which also, with this company, was a favorable month throughout. The rapid increase of trade indicated by these late features promises well for the early spring business. The fact is recognized that all winter the move ment of lumber has been large, and the stuff

has gone to supply at nediate demand.

MARCH 4. - The Journal of Commerce says :-The market for the present may be rated as good. A great many stories are being circulated, which, in many cases, would convey the idea that the outlook had been considerably overrated. However, in view of actual reports from the producing districts and the general indications of activity in the way of building in the spring, it does not seem to be a mistake in judgment to say that the spring trade promises to be at least as large as for many years. At any race, that seems to be the general impression among dealers in this vicinity. The stocks on hand in many of the jards are far from what they ought to be, both in arrangement and amount. At most of the great western centres there has been sufficient snow to permit of better legging than had been experienced in the early part of the winter. At some points orders are being placed without difficulty at an advance of \$2 on culls and \$3.50@\$4 on first quality over last spring's prices. It is difficult to ship lumber from many points in the south and west owing to the lack of freight facilities. Hardwoods are firm, with good sales reported, and at STATIONARY, very stiff prices.






