Nocal and Political Antelligence.

An extra from the Morning Chronicle office conveyed the information, on Tuesday morning, obtained by telegraph at a late hour of the preceding night, that the Provincial Parliament was dissolved, by Proclamation from His Excellency the Governor General issued on Monday last. By another Pro-clamation, writs for calling a Provincial Parliament are ordered to be issued on the same day, returnable on the 21th day of January next .- It is not stated on what day Parliament is to meet for despatch of business.

Model Longing-house in the Mint, South-WARK .- A new model lodging-house, for the accommodation of the labouring classes, has been opened in Mint-street, Southwark. It was formerly a furniture warehouse, and is admirably adapted for the purpose, the rooms being spacious, lofty, and well ventilated. The interior arrangements are similar to those which have been previously opened by the Society for Improving the Condition of the Labouring Classes; each person is provided with a separate hed; and the bedsteads being made of iron, very little attention is required to keep them in a clean state. On the ground-floor there is a wellassorted library of upwards of 500 volumes, to which the inmates have access gratuitously, and three weekly newspapers and periodicals are also provided. The establishment is quite full, and several applicants for admission have been refused, for want of room. The inmates consist principally of persons who work in the Borough and Billingsgate markets, and at the various wharfs in Tooley-street. Another establishment on a similar plan is in course of construction in the same neighbourhood; and one, for the exclusive accommodation of single women of good character, who chtain a livelihood by needlework and other light employment, will be opened early in the ensuing year. This last will be under he immediate superintendence of a Committee of ladies .- Record.

. Accounts via Louisville, received by the arrival of traders from Santa Fe, state that another insurrection had taken place among the Mexicans at Chihunhua, and the American residents there forced to fly to escape being massacred, leaving much of their property behind.

Col. Easton was mustering a force to march against the insurgents, and a battle was shortly expected to take place.

Commissioners for the exploratory survey of a route suffered, for this great and truly important national undertaking, Major Robinson and Captain Henderson of the Royal Engineers, arrived in this City from Fredericton yesterday, with a party of Sappers and Miners under their command, and will proceed on Tuesday next to Halifax, by special steamer to Windsor. Their labours in the field have closed for the season, and the winter will be spent in Halifax in preparing plans and sections of the several lines of country which have been examined.

It affords us sincere pleasure to announce, that the Commissioners have already reported to Her Majesty's Government the existence of a good and practicable route for a railway, for the entire line from Halifax to Quebec: and that in the whole distance, which is upwards of 600 miles, not more than twenty miles present any difficulties whatever, and those not of a serious nature, but merely such as will somewhat increase the average expense of the line, many portions of which offer extraordinary facilities. We are also gratified to learn that the Commissioners express themselves greatly pleased with the beauty and fertility of the country they have passed through within this Province, which is said to be, almost without exception, admirably adapted for settlement and cultivation, and to abound

in valuable resources. It must be remembered that these Railway Commissioners are also, in conjunction with the Hon. Mr. Johnston, Attorney General of Nova Scotia, the Commissioners for the settlement of the disputed boundary between this Province and Canada, which we trust will now be settled satisfactorily.

Mr. Grant, whose extraordinary and almost miraculous escape from death by starvation in the wilderness, we noticed last week, has been brought to Fredericton by Captain Henderson. Mr. Grant's hands and teet are in a very bad state from the frost, and he is greatly enfeebled and broken down from his sufferings; but it is hoped that by care and attention, he will ultimately recover his health and strength.—New Brunswick Courier.

FACILITIES OF COMMUNICATION, -It is with pleasure we learn that the formation of the plank roads from Brampton to Port Credit, and from Streetsville to Dundas Street, is now a matter of absolute certainty, and operations will be commenced us regards both of them, as soon as the season per-[sits .- Church.

The Kingston papers give an account of a falal secident which happened to the steamer Wave, by the bursting of her boiler, while engaged in towing a raft on the Rideau Canal, on the 29th ultimo.

By the explosion, three persons were killed; the pilot, a fireman, and a boy: their bodies are said to have been blown to the distance of upwards of a Councils of that Island, aged 47 years.

Mr. Iliram Ives, the Captain of the boat, fell in the water about 20 yards from the boat, when he was picked up. He nevertheless, we are happy to state, suffered little injury. The engineer has been very severely scalded, and his recovery is very uncertain. Two more of the hands were more or less injured, but are doing well. It is not exacty known how the accident occurred .- Morn.

A coronor's inquest was held in Toronto on the 4th instant on the body of a young man who died suddenly of "delirium tremens." The jury returned the following verdict:—

Verdict of the Coroner's jury in the case of William Paris Vincent, son of General Vincent of the East India Company's Service, on Thursday the 4th instant:—"(That the said W. Paris Vincent, on the 3rd day of Nov., departed this life by delirium tremens, induced by habits of excessive drinking; and they [the jury] considered Mr. Sutherland highly blamcable in supplying him with Wines in large quantities within the last ten days, he knowing the young man's previous habits."—Toronto Examiner.

The Disinfecting Fluids.—The experiments with these fluids have been brought to a close, and from all that we have heard and read upon the subject, our opinion as to any disinfecting properties possessed by either Sir W. Burnett or M. Ledoyen's, is still unaltered. According to the results of some experiments made at the Marine Hospital, Quebec, to determine which possessed the greater power in mitigating or destroying the effluvium from soil, votes were given in favour of Sir W. Burnett's fluid. We apprehend, however, that not much difference exists between them both in this respect. Some disagreement having erisen between the experimenters, M. Ledoyen treated the profession in Quebec to some novel therapeutic ideas in relation to the injurious agency of the preparations of Zinc on the animal economy when applied to, and absorbed from, ulcerated surfaces. This is worth noticing, only in so far as it evinces to what extent a preconceived notion, with strong enthusiasm, can warp the judgment and influence the reasoning faculties of an individual. M. Ledoyen has left for England, after having suffered from typhus himself; and poor Colonel Calvert is no more, having succumbed to a more virulent attack of the same disease. We sincerely sympathize with Colonel Calvert's family in the bereavement which they have suffered; but, at the same time, we regard the consequences to M. Ledoyen and Colonel Calvert, as a strong proof of the fallacy of the views which they entertained, and as affording matter for a homily on the whole offair. -Br. Am. Journal of Medical and

MONTREAL AND LACHINE RAILBOAD.-We are informed that what might have been a serious but which, happily, proved a trifling accident, occurred yesterday on the Lachine Railroad. The rails, on a spot not far from the village of the Tanneries, would appear to have slightly diverged from a direct line, at one of the joinings, and the consequence was, that the engine and cars-the former on the left, the latter on the right hand-were carried off the road, and proceeded about a hundred yards, but without upsetting, before they could be stopped. About 100 passengers were, thus, put to the inconvenience of finishing their journey on foot; but, we are happy to hear that no injury was suffered by any one, and that the damage, if any, done to the engine and cars, was very slight. The engine and cars have since arrived, and will leave this morning at the usual hour.—Herald.
