It may be a matter of some interest to A Point of Law. our readers to know what legal rights are possessed by persons who may desire to move a building along the public streets from one situation to another. The Supreme Court of New Jersey expressed the opinion that the use of a public highway for such purpose was not within the rights enjoyable by the public in a public highway for the purpose of travel. The Supreme Court of Indiana decided that although citizens had the right to ordinary use of the streets they could not interrupt traffic or discommode the public by tearing down electric wires in order to remove buildings along the streets. In the case of the Toronto Street Railway Company vs. Dollery, it was held that a person cannot lawfully blockade the tracks of a railway company by moving a building.

Teaching of Archi- WE have the pleasure to present in this tec ure at McGill number a personal sketch and portrait University. of Professor Capper, who has been chosen to fill the newly established Chair of Architecture at McGill University, Montreal. Professor Capper was honored by being called upon at the very outset of his career in McGill, to deliver the annual university lecture.
