Nuclear Age. The table of contents and a 1987 update were distributed to libraries across Canada and abroad.

Institute researchers also made their work known through a variety of non-CIIPS publications, including some of the leading professional journals. (see Annex C)

The research group continued its role in the Institute's Canadian-Soviet Exchange Programme, organizing the visits of Canadian scholars to the USSR. And it was very active in the planning and organization of Institute seminars and workshops. Doina Cioiu, Research Administrator, assisted by Cécile Sicard, bore most of this responsibility.

Institute researchers continued to participate actively, during 1990–91, in a large number of conferences, panel discussions, and public meetings. They also provided oral and written testimony and comments for parliamentary committees and groups; and gave briefings and comments on current issues to journalists, and for television programmes and other media events.

Future Directions

Over 1990–91, the Institute completed the major task of hiring a full complement of highly qualified research staff. Now the objective is to capitalize on this available expertise and commitment in order to push forward the Institute's work at both the national and international levels.
