PETRO-CANADA

PURCHASE OF BRITISH PETROLEUM COMPANY SERVICE STATIONS AND REFINERIES

Mr. Harvie Andre (Calgary Centre): Madam Speaker, in the absence of the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources I will put my question to the Minister of Finance. It deals with the proposed purchase of British Petroleum service stations and refineries. Given that Canada's No. 1 economic problem is a depression level unemployment rate, and given that last week the Minister of Finance stated that he could only find modest amounts of cash to fight this problem, how does the Minister of Finance, on behalf of the Government, justify spending \$350 million of public funds on a purchase which will not generate a single new job? In fact it will cost jobs, because previously BP and Fina were frequently competitors on the same corner and now there will be only one service station and one marketing department. Therefore there will be a net loss of jobs. How does the Minister of Finance justify the expenditure at this point in time?

Hon. Marc Lalonde (Minister of Finance): Madam Speaker, as was announced by Petro-Canada, this purchase will be financed without asking for one cent from the Public Treasury or one cent from the taxpayers of Canada.

Some Hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Lalonde: It has been taken by Petro-Canada as a business decision that will be totally financed on the market per se, and it will be a self-financing operation. It has been considered by the board of directors of Petro-Canada as a very good business deal. Knowing the support that Petro-Canada has received from Canadian consumers, I am convinced that this will also prove to be an excellent decision in all respects.
