He applied to Pelleport, offering him the superintendance of a publication to be carried on at Bruges (near Ostend), the salary of which was to be two hundred pounds per annum. Pelleport accepted the offer. But it was necessary to stop at Boulogne, where some final arrangements were to be made. In the month of July Pelleport embarked for Boulogne with Captain Meredith. But the moment he landed, he was feized by the officers of the Police, who put him in chains and carried him to Paris, where he was fent to the Bastile. Du M--- was an agent of the Police of Paris." Information being given to the Police, that Briffot was at Boulogne, and that he was the intimate friend of Pelleport, he was immediately taken into custody, carried to Paris, and committed to the Bastile.
