Despite statements in Washington despatches to the contrary, Senor Luis Elguero, ex-member of the Huertista delegation to the A.B.C. conference, is not in Europe, but was in Toronto yesterday. After a conference in the morning with several prominent Mexicans at the King Edward Hotel, the former mediator left last night for Montreal. He was accompanied by Senor Emilio Rabassa, another of the mediators, who spent several hours in the city during the afternoon.

Both Elguero and Rabassa declined t comment extensively upon the Huerta-Diaz revolution, which is said to be hatching in Toronto, Mr. Elguero said he would return on Friday, when, he

went to confer with certain financial men who are said to have interests in Mexico, and probably will support the revolution. General Diaz denied the report printed in an afternoon newspaper Tuesday that he had had a rupture with Gen. Huerta. "The entire story is a fabrication." said Mr. Diaz. "I have not met Gen, Huerta for some time, but there is no truth in the reports that we have quarreled." Ignorant of Conditions.

The declaration of Senor Jose Castellot, personal representative of President Carbajal in Washington, that Huerta and Diaz never would join in planning a counter-revolution, according to a prominent Mexican speaking to The World last night, shows Senor Castellot's lack of knowledge of recent events in Mexico. Generals Huerta and Diaz, it was pointed out, worked together to overthrow Madero in 1913, and both belong to the Clentifico party. A breach between them at this time, it was said, would not be possible.

Agree to Second Reading of Amending Bill, But No. Concessions.

LONDON, Thursday morning, July
30.—Owing to the European crisis the
amending home rule bill, which comes up for its second reading today, does not engross so much attention as it would otherwise have done. There has been much uncertainty as to the attitude that the Nationalists would adopt but at a meeting yesterday at which sixty-five of the party were present, it was decided provisionally to support it. This decision was made on the understanding that Premier Asquith today states the intention of the gov-ernment to restore the bill to its original form minus the time limit to county exclusion. If he indicates that the government will go any further than this, Redmond has plenary powers to declare the policy of the party and to place them in opposition to the government. Mr. Asquith's statement in moving the second reading will be a full and important one, and subsequent events depend upon it in view of the foreign situation. It is probable that the second reading debate will be concluded today and that the difficult committee stage will be postponed for the present.
