PETROGRAD, Jan. 22.—(A)ltho the Carpathians are now snow and frost bound under the most rigorous period of winter and operations on both sides have consequently slackened, the steady sealing up of Hungary from the north, south and east becomes daily a more urgent problem for Germany's ally. The Russians now hold solidly the Beska and Ussok passes and in Bukovina the army has just taken the important Vorokhta pass on the east. The Austrians are retreating rapidly north from Dorno Vatra thru the territory populated by Rumanians. It is this imminent crisis that has sent the Austrian emperor's heir with the new foreign minister, Count Burian, and military experts to visit the Kaiser at the German headquarters. Their mission unquestionably is to secure immediate support against the movement in Austria for seeking peace. Peace Demand Grows. It is known that three months ago, during the days when the Austrians were in Belgrade, Count Benchtold sanctioned the taking of certain steps at Athens with the view of mediating between Servia and Austria. Austria, however, refused to assist the Austrian initiative, which was soon obliterated by Servia's great victory. Every week makes the necessity of settlement more urgent and despite Count Burian's political connections, strong influences in Austria are looking for a basis for direct action. They complain that a portion of the Austrian army has been sent against the French and English, that a large portion is (Continued on Page 2, Column 4.)

PARIS, Jan. 22.—The winter campaign continues, with both sides attempting to gain as many of each other as possible without being able to make an appreciable advance. In this business of slaughter the allies appear to excel, for earlier deficiencies in artillery have been supplied by the French and British, and this arm will be a growing factor in the war. The improvement of and increase in the number of big guns have had the effect of appreciably reducing the losses on the part of the allies to about a quarter of those experienced in the first campaign in respect to the numbers engaged, and the soldiers have also become inured to trench fighting and take care of themselves better. Fighting today was fiercest at four or five points. In some cases the attacks were rebuffed, while in others they were still proceeding. Increased activity of the Germans is reported at several points. The French got the range of a German battery in the wood of St. Marde and put it out of action. The Argonne was still the area of heavy fighting. In an assault on a field work called Marie Therese near Fontaine Madame, the enemy was repulsed in two vigorous counter attacks, but fighting went on throughout the day. It became extremely furious, but the French still held their positions at nightfall. The Germans also made night attacks on the French lines at the Hartman-Wellerhoff hills, but these did not succeed. The contest did not cease with nightfall the next day. The French still remain silent concerning their operations in Alsace, but unofficial communications report them as having drawn closer to the Rhine north of Muhlhausen. AMSTERDAM, Jan. 22.—Heavy fighting is reported to have taken place Jan. 20 and 21 south of Lille, which the Germans still hold. The town is said to be suffering from lack of provisions and the few remaining inhabitants are said to be in need of food. The Belgian civil guards have been forced by the Germans to sign a declaration that they will not fight against the German troops. COPENHAGEN, Jan. 22.—There is absolute calm in the Austrian campaign against Servia, declares a private despatch from Berlin. The Austrians are confining their operations to patrolling the Danube and the Slavians with most of the Danube army are still in the occupied positions. A new army of Austrians, with force of 30,000 Saxons and Brunawickers, is forming to renew the attack on Servia. The organization is said to be under the direction of German staff officers. The new army, comprising the Austrian Fifth Army Corps, is under the command of Archduke Eugene, who succeeded General Potiorek after the failure of the last Servian campaign. AUSTRIAN GOVERNMENT FORCED TO FEED PEOPLE State Stores Called on for Fourteen Hundred and Fifty Tons of Flour. Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World. COPENHAGEN, Jan. 22.—Owing to the gravity of the food situation in Vienna the government is bringing 1450 tons of flour from the government stores into the city to provide for the population. TRAIN DELAYS FEW DESPITE SNOWFALL Railway Traffic Was Not Seriously Hindered by Yesterday's Blizzard. In spite of the blizzard which raged through the province yesterday afternoon and last night, traffic on the railways was not seriously impeded. It was reported by railway officials at the Union Station that the passenger trains arriving at and departing from Toronto had kept pretty close to the scheduled running time. With high winds and drifting snow, the train crews and dispatchers had their hands full, but the continual use of the huge snowplows, which were put to work early in the storm, kept the roads open. It was feared that the train drawing the two private cars in which the viceregal party left for Ottawa at 10:30 might be held up by the heavy drifts in the deep cutting near Myrtle, Ont., but the road at this point was kept clear and the train passed on schedule time. ZEPPELINS CARRIED HEAVY GUNS. Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World. COPENHAGEN, Jan. 22.—A brief account of the Zeppelin raid of Tuesday last reaches here from Berlin. An air fleet composed of several specially selected ocean Zeppelins of exceptionally high speed, left a secret air station in Germany. Each ship was manned by a full complement of officers and men and equipped with comparatively heavy guns, together with the largest possible supply of ammunition. The airships crossed the North Sea at a very high altitude and were not discovered till they descended to 2000 feet above the east coast of England. They returned to a secret landing place. Berlin has bestowed the title of "Air Vikings" on the Zeppelin crews. MOVEMENT FOR PEACE AT CONSTANTINOPLE Party Headed by Yussuf Pasha Gains Many Adherents—German Heads War Element. PETROGRAD, Jan. 22.—The Reich reports that Yussuf Pasha had headed the peace party in Constantinople, which has gained many adherents among Turkish officials. Gen. Von Der Goltz, who was sent to Constantinople by the Kaiser to act as the Sultan's military adviser, is regarded as the head of the German party.

Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World. PETROGRAD, Jan. 22.—Threatened on both flanks, Gen. Von Hindenburg's army before Warsaw is erecting defensive works in its present position across the Bzura. It is believed that the Austrians have failed in their attempt to advance in southern Poland, and that the Germans' right flank will be exposed to danger similar to that which threatens from the Russian army which has advanced past Plock, north of the Vistula. The two Russian armies in the north, in the Mazurian Lake region, and in north Poland, are both operating on the offensive, and it is believed that they are aiming at the complete occupation of East Prussia. It is pointed out by the military critic of The Novo Russkay that the occupation of this region to a line running thru Soldau and Allenstein would considerably shorten the Russian line, which now is spread over a long front. GERMANS DEFINITELY REPULSED. Special Direct Copyrighted Cable to The Toronto World.
