ENGTH nine inches. Bill an inch and a half long, black, flout, sharp, and a very little bent at the tip; shat on the top towards the base, where it is rounded, and passes far back on the forehead, and is there a little protuberant, like the former ones: the general colour of the plumage is black: the head, neck, and breast, have a fine gloss of purple: the whole wing, and rest of the body, black: the tail consists of twelve feathers, and was five inches in length, but had been longer, as the ends were spoiled: the wings reach a little beyond the insertion of the tail: the legs were wanting.

I found this in the collection of Miss Blomefield; it was supposed to come from Cayenne. A label annexed gave it the name of Oiseau de Ris, de grosse espece.
