WHEN WILL B. OF CONTROL LOOK OVER THE TOWN?

May Make the Trip To-day—West Toronto News—County Happenings Generally.

NORTH TORONTO, Feb. 7.—(Special.)—At the last meeting of the Board of Control of the city a tacit understanding was arrived at with reference to the visit of the members to North Toronto, and which was fixed for to-morrow (Wednesday), but whether the arrangement will be carried out, remains to be seen. Controller Hocken was not present at yesterday's meeting of the board, and the trip may be postponed for the present.

At the last meeting of the Ontario Railway Board, when the question of the double-tracking of Yonge-street was under the limelight, Chairman Lettich was especially emphatic and dogmatic relative to the next meeting of the board, at which the matter would be considered. "I will not postpone it any longer than Feb. 15," said Chairman Lettich, and it will be discussed very soon after that date.

This practically leaves only one week for the visit of the board of control and the holding of a special meeting of the city council (if it is decided to hold one), and arrive at some definite decision with regard to the vital question of annexation. From the fortnight which was at first suggested as the time limit in which the Town of North Toronto would know its fate the time has lengthened out to nearly six weeks, and so far no progress has been made. It is a long time since the sewage scheme was first trotted out, and after all the torrents of oratory and midnight oil consumed in its consideration by the council, not to mention the Ratepayers' Association, the scheme apparently still looks like the whole scheme would continue to do service as a source of contention for a long time to come.

At last night's meeting of the North Toronto Council T. W. Banton was placed on the library board, but Mr. Banton is averse to serving in this capacity especially as he is already a member of the Toronto Library Board.

Good progress is being made with the Bedford Park school, and from present indications this fine educational institution will be completed in time to receive the pupils after the Easter holidays.

There was a notable improvement in the service accorded the patrons over the Metropolitan line to-day. Glen Grove cars were running for the most part on schedule time, while the thru line was very little behind.

It is a long time since the sleighing on Yonge-street was better than it is right now, and a number of accidents near the street took advantage of the occasion to-day to bring down supplies of grain and produce.

The program outlined by the Dovercourt Land Co. is one of the largest ever undertaken in the town, and will furnish a lot of employment for laborers in the building of the water mains and sidewalks.

With the initial proceedings undertaken by the Township of York, it looks like as the town will soon be called upon to undertake the practical work of dealing with the roadways thru Mount Pleasant Cemetery.

Whether annexation follows as the result of the pending negotiations, or not, the city is morally responsible with the town for the opening up of a new highway north from St. Andrew's College and east of Yonge-street. Every year adds to the congestion and difficulty of putting this road thru.

North Toronto ought to have a snow-cleaning bylaw, and the need of it was never more clearly demonstrated than to-day. It is not enough that the town snow cleaner is along. Every citizen ought to have enough ambition to clean off his own walk, but if he hasn't, the bylaw would emphasize the need of it.

All the local links were well patronized to-night, and every body enjoyed the delightful time. The Daville and Bedford rinks, in the pleasure afforded, have already been visited up and down twice over. The carnival on the Daville rink was a wonderful success. St. George's Hall was well filled last night for the February meeting of the Horticultural Society. In a lecture by J. McP. Ross on dahlias, he said:

These plants will grow as easily as potatoes, if given rich, well worked soil. They are most desirable also because of their wealth of blossom, bright colors and late flowering season. Care must be taken not to plant them too early lest the tender shoots be nipped by the spring frosts. The endeavor was formerly to get the blossoms of a dahlia as closely set and formal as possible.
