It is nearly two years also since the sewage scheme was first trotted out, and after sil the torrents of oratory and midnight oil consumed in its consideration by the council, not to mention the Ratepayers' Association, the scheme is apparently still in embryo. After all is said and done, it looks as tho the whole scheme would continue to do service as a source of contention for a long time to come. Less than haif a day would serve to show the board of control the merits and demerits of the whole annexation plan, and it does seem as tho they might have devoted a couple of hours to the settlement of a question which is manifestly keeping the townspeople of North Toronto on the ragged edge of uncertainty.
