

NEW CAR TRACKS

Ten Miles Completed and Harbor-Street Open.

Already ten miles of the new street car lines have been completed, and the remainder are rapidly nearing completion. The Harbor-street line, from Spadina to Ossington and from there to Bloor, has been finished. It is a mile and a half long. Mr. Fleming, manager of the Toronto Railway Company, will be informed shortly that he can run his cars there.

The Wilton-ave. line is now in working order from Queen and Victoria-st. to the Wilton-ave. bridge, via Wilton. The tracks have been laid on the east end of the bridge. There remains some more work to be done before it can be carried thru to Broadview-ave. Some houses must be torn down on Elliott-st., and the work that is being done on the trunk sewer in that locality is also delaying proceedings.

From Bathurst to York-st., the Adelaide-st. line has been practically finished. From Church to Victoria on Adelaide line has been almost finished. The men are working now on the part of Adelaide-between York and Bay, and between Yonge and Victoria. The tracks will be laid between Bay and Yonge after the exhibition. The line along Teraulay, Agnes and St. Patrick-st. will be commenced during the exhibition.

Will Meet in Cleveland. SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—Cleveland was chosen as the place for the next annual convention of the International Typographical Union at tonight's session of the convention here, by a vote of 114 to 108 cast for Houston, Texas. Decision was on the second ballot. Ottawa, Ont., and Vancouver, B.C., dropped out after the first ballot.
